The Citizens' band is engaged by the Chief Justice to play to-night at Brighton Villa. In consequence the promenade concert in the gardens is postponed till Wednesday evening.

A B. Warburton, Esq., received a postal card on Monday August 5, dated Aug. 3, stating that Lofar, entered by Messrs. Dawson of North Tryon, would trot at the races on the 17th.

A STEAMER will leave Cranberry, Hagerty's and Hickey's wharf on Wednesday morning at the usual hour for the Caledonian Gathering. Return will leave Prince Street wharf at 5 p. m.

In the police court Monday, besides the number of liquor cases published in another column, one nuisance case was dismissed. Elizabeth Finley, having no where to go the magistrate set her to jail till she found a place for her.

THE Scottish Gathering tomorrow will be indeed a gala day. In addition to the many interesting events on the program, the arrivals of the warships, Blake and Magicienne, will add greatly to the many interesting attractions of the day.

Messrs Geo Henry Eaton, J. O. P. Frazer and Harry C. Taylor, delegates from the I. O. O. F. Halifax, to attend the session of Grand Lodge to be opened at Summerside tomorrow, arrived last night and registered at the Queen. They go west this morning. Other delegates are expected to-night.

SOME time ago we referred to large hen's eggs, each weighing 3 1/2 oz and measuring 7 1/2 by 5 1/2. These are the largest on record. Mr. E. van Campbell of North Wilshire has an egg weighing 4 ounces, and measuring 8 by 6 1/2 inches, laid by a Plymouth Rock hen owned by D. W. Henderson of North Wilshire.

THE SCOTTISH GATHERING—The new steamer Jacques Cartier will leave O'Connell wharf at 7 o'clock tomorrow morning, calling at Halliday's wharf, and returning in the evening. This fine boat's large accommodation for passengers offers the people of Belfast and surrounding districts a grand chance to attend the gathering.

THE next Y.M.C.A. convention will be held at Charlottetown, Pictou, St. Stephen and St. Martins tonight to obtain next summer, but the vote of President Fitzpatrick sent it to Prince Edward Island. Judge Hensley among the English, Ch'town, and D. Stewart, S'ide, are members of the maritime executive committee for the year.

Two young fellows well nigh paralyzed with drink were sitting on the ground near the Y.M.C.A. building Saturday afternoon. One of them had a flask of liquor and was trying to force the fiery fluid down his throat, although he was so full that he could swallow it. The liquor was running out of his mouth at almost out of his eyes. His comrade was unable to drain the bottle. We have not heard of any further report of their spree.

PRIZE ESSAYS—Miss Ina Macmillan of Wood Islands has been awarded Col. J. D. Irving's prize for the best essay on "Scottish Pioneer Life in P. E. Island." Mr. S. D. McPhee of Glen William has been awarded the second prize offered by the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, and Mr. Nicholson of Boston, Mass., had the third essay in order of merit. Professor Caven, P. W. College, and Malcolm McLeod, Q. C., were the judges.

A BAD suicide occurred at Westmoreland, near Crapaud, on Saturday last when Wm. Matters, farmer, died at his own hands in his own barn. For some time past he had been in poor health. His mind became demented and it was thought advisable to send him to the asylum. He appeared to be getting better, and he was kept at home. Saturday morning his wife, going into the barn, found him hanging to a rafter. She alarmed the neighbors and took down the body. He was not dead. The doctor was summoned, but he died early Sunday morning.

CH'TOWN came very near being without a mayor yesterday. In the afternoon his worship Mayor Haviland and Charles Palmer, Esq., secured a boat at the railway wharf and prepared to embark on a visit to H.M.S. Blake. There was no ladder at the wharf and the party had some difficulty in getting on the boat. His worship was the last to go down. The water was very rough and the wind and tide strong. Mr. Haviland had just got his feet on the gunwale when he lost his balance and fell over into the sea. The men in charge of the boat made a grab for him as he came up, but missed him. A second attempt was successful. He was caught by the shoulders and pulled safe on board. In the evening he was able to be out, none the worse for his ducking.

H.M.S. BLAKE, flagship, arrived at 1 o'clock Monday and anchored off the railway wharf. She is accompanied by the cruiser Magicienne, Capt. Pilon, a vessel of 2950 tons and 9000 horse power. The Blake presents a handsome appearance. She will remain in port till Friday next, when she will leave for Halifax, thence to Quebec and return. She will remain in Halifax till she goes to the West Indies in the fall. Monday afternoon Lieut. Col. Irving, Aid-de-camp, and Mr. Harrison Carvell, private secretary to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, visited the Chief Justice and later His Lordship officers of both ships will be entertained at a ball at Chief Justice Sullivan's this evening and at Hon. L. H. Davies' tomorrow evening.

P. E. ISLAND. PERSONS using the Telephone would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following Rules:

1st. Speak with your mouth about four inches from the transmitter.

2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too loud, and distinctly.

3rd. Place the Telephone so as to cover the Ear, just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds. Do not press too hard on the Ear.

It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you shout loud enough, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying to all within range of your voice.
