Physicians Rap Tranquillizers

EDMONTON (CP)—The widespread use of so-called tranquillizer drugs—"happiness pills"—was condemned at the Canadian Medical Association convention Thursday for the third time this week. One doctor said physicians who are prescribing these drugs freely show "lack of discernment on the part of the profession." Another rapped their "frivolous" use by a glib public and warned of side-effects "often distressing and sometimes dangerous."

Earlier the CMA, as the representative of 11,700 Canadian doctors, showed concern over rapidly-increasing sales of the tranquillizers in this country and resolved to have the federal government put them on the prescription list.

Fifty million prescriptions for these drugs were written in Canada last year. In the United States large quantities of tranquillizers are sold in some provinces. They are on the prescription list in other provinces but the CMA fears "under-the-counter" sales.

Dr. T. F. Rose, a Victoria specialist in internal medicine, told the CMA that the tranquillizers have some value in the treatment of mental disease and alcoholism.

But the "vast majority of the pills are being taken frivolously" by persons suffering from nothing more than the normal anxieties of life, he said.

"In mankind's naive but age-old search to get happiness out of a bottle," Dr. Rose said, the tranquillizers may prove eventually to "rate as a good deal more expensive than phenobarb and a good deal less honest than whiskey."

The side-effects of the tranquillizers should "stand as a barrier to their indiscriminate use under loose control," he said. Among these were nightmares and bizarre behavior. In the use of stronger tranquillizers, there were many cases of severe depression and some suicides.

Dr. D. E. Rodger of Regina, federal representative of the national health and welfare department, said doctors are "using far too often" are using these unnecessarily.

Among these drugs were the so-called tranquillizers.

Perhaps Columbus would have discovered the new world while taking tranquillizers and maybe Beethoven would have composed symphonies, Dr. Rose said, "but I submit that if they had been full of these drugs they wouldn't have bothered."

Poland Has Won Some Concession

WARSAW (AP)—In 12 tense months since the Poznan riots, 28,000 Poles have won a lot more freedom and a little more food.

The local brand of communism has been purged of all the terror and some of the bureaucratic nonsense.

Time and again people will tell you: "Things are just the same." Every objective observer knows things are not the same. But until they get a better living and better homes the Poles will remain uneasy and skeptical of every promise of improvement.

The workers who streamed through the Poznan streets last June swept away secret police atrocities, spy mania, radio jamming, brutal "work discipline" and forced participation in futile mass demonstrations. Poles can say—though not write—that they think without fear of reprisal.

The parish priest is back at the village school teaching scriptures. Poles have taken over — posts formerly held by Russians. Thousands of political prisoners have been released and no political arrests have been reported.

Russian school books have been scrapped. Travel abroad is easier, though still far from easy. No longer does a Pole who fought in the West or with the anti-Communist resistance have trouble finding a job. Universities have won academic freedom. Western papers can be bought on government newsstands.

But hundreds of thousands still live crowded three, four, five and even 10 to a room. Despite wage increases officially estimated at 20 per cent, a man's pay still will not feed a wife and two children.

The daily journey to and from work still is an exhausting nightmare of scrambling, kicking and shoving to get a place on an overcrowded streetcar.

No U. S. Jurisdiction Problem In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Jurisdictional wrangles such as those disturbing U.S.-Japanese harmony have never ruffled the good relations between Newfoundlanders and their well-behaved guests, the American servicemen.

United States Air Force officials say the question of jurisdiction has never assumed great importance in this area for three major reasons.

"Firstly the good relations between the citizens of St. John's and base personnel; secondly the close co-operation between the department of the attorney-general in Newfoundland and the base legal authorities; and thirdly, the close co-operation between the civil and military police forces."

Newfoundlanders were asked to accept the U.S. bases in 1941 as a wartime sacrifice by Sir Winston Churchill. Given 99-year leases, the USAF set up bases at St. John's, St. John's on the West Coast, and Goose Bay in Labrador. A naval station was established at Argentia on the South Coast.

There are now between 12,000 and 14,000 American personnel stationed in the province and the bases pump about \$35,000,000 a year into the provincial economy to rank as the third largest "industry."

Legal relations with the Americans are termed "excellent" by the Newfoundland attorney-general's department which approved a statement to The Canadian Press from USAF headquarters at Peppercorn air force base here explaining how the operators of Newfoundland authorities have primary jurisdiction with few exceptions over all offences under the criminal code committed off base by American service personnel," the USAF says.

Minor cases punishable by fines are tried in the Newfoundland civil court. Base authorities usually request a transfer of jurisdiction in cases serious enough to warrant a jail sentence. They are tried at Peppercorn by summary court martial and sentences are served in American jails.
