Ch'town USC Has Branch Status For Director's Visit

This year, for the first time the Charlotteville members of the Unitarian Service of Canada constitute a branch in their own right as they are host to Dr. Lotia Hiltzmanova, executive director of the USC. Dr. Hiltzmanova arrived in the city last evening following a 50,000 mile trip to over 50 US cities in 12 countries.

Organized by Dr. Hiltzmanova in 1946, the USC adheres to basic principles of non-dominantism. This Canadian voluntary relief and rehabilitation agency brings help to those in greatest human need in Asia, Europe and the Middle East, regardless of nationality, creed, color or caste.
