THE citizens' committee for the 1st July celebration at Shediac are busily engaged in raising a subscription, for a grand turnout on that day. A parade is to take place. A regatta and a match game of baseball between Shediac and Point du Chene are also talked of.

THE steam cruiser Acadia called at Souris on Wednesday last, and after remaining a short time weighed anchor and put to sea. Folks say that her commander, Capt. Gordon, means business and will do his duty in protecting our fisheries against all trespassers within the three mile limit. Treaty rights are to be maintained to the utmost possible extent.

ABOUT two o'clock yesterday afternoon, smoke was discovered issuing from the corner of the premises occupied by John McEachen, Esq., as a boot and shoe store. On cutting away the outside boards, it was found that the corner post of the house adjoining the store of Messrs. Weeks & Beer, on Queen Street, was completely burnt through. It was extinguished without any material damage being done. Origin unknown.

Tenants Arrested.

DUBLIN, June 19. Several tenants arrested at Bodeko for resisting evicting officers, have been sentenced to prison at hard labor for terms ranging from one to three months. They were taken to Ennis Station under a heavy escort of police. Crowds of sympathizing people gathered and cheered the prisoners, and the police were ordered to disperse them. They plied their batons so vigorously that several people were severely injured.

The Floods.

PESTH, June 19. Floods in Hungary are subsiding. The dangers of Make and Vassahety are out of town, and if the present dry weather continues the water in the flooded districts will be gone in six weeks. There is great distress among the inhabitants of the inundated regions, and danger of fever. Fifteen hundred farmers are totally ruined. The entire damage is estimated at \$5,000,000.

Knights.

OTTAWA, June 18. Information was received by cable this afternoon that Dr. J. A. Grant, of this city, had been created by Her Majesty a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, in recognition of his services to science and the medical profession.

Yacht Racing.

LONDON, June 19. The Mersey Yacht Club race between the Thistle and Irix took place yesterday. The start was made at 10.50 a. m. The Thistle finished at 6.44 p. m., several minutes ahead of the Irix.

Earthquake.

SOMERVILLE, S. C., June 19. A startling shock of earthquake was felt here at 10.35 this morning, accompanied by a prolonged roaring not heard since October 22nd of last year.

Pilgrims Drowned.

PESTH, June 19. While 250 pilgrims were crossing the Danube the boat was caught in a hurricane and capsized, only a few of the party were saved. Over 100 bodies have been recovered.

Thomas Committed.

MONCTON, N. B., June 18. An investigation into the perjury charge against George P. Thomas was held to-day before Justice Grant. It resulted in Thomas being committed for trial.

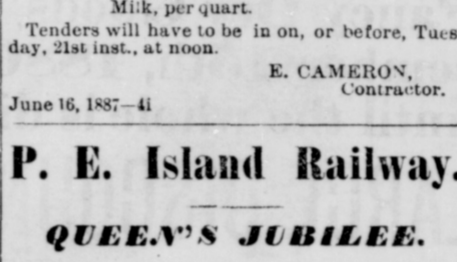
