Hanlan is staying in Dublin.

The census just taken in the City of Berlin, Prussia, shows the population, including the garrison, to be 1,118,630, thus being sixteen per cent above the population of 1875, having more than double since 1860.

Gambling is very greatly increasing in London. At a club, which is sufficiently well known to all who take an interest in such matters, a gentleman lost at baccarat—and paid—no less than £5,000 in ready cash the other night. What makes it more serious is that this same gentleman had previously lost some £9,000 at the same game at the same club.

It is semi-officially stated that the report that Greece has consented to renew direct negotiations with Turkey are incorrect. It is also stated that the Powers have commenced an interchange of views on the Greek question and will probably endeavor to obtain formal engagements from both countries not to resort to arms, but to rely on the diplomacy of Europe to effect an equitable compromise.

In the Italian Chamber of Deputies, Premier Cairoli, replying to the representations made the Turkish representative here, said that the Philhellenic Committee of Action, composed of ex-Garibaldian officers, to aid Greece in the event of war with Turkey, was more ideal than real; that the government would never permit Italian citizens to violate the international duties of Italy. The publication of the manifesto of the committee has been forbidden.

**Household Hints.**

**Essence of Celery.**—This is prepared by soaking for a fortnight a half ounce of the seeds of celery in a quarter pint of brandy. A few drops will flavor a pint of soup or broth equal to a head of celery.

**Corn Cakes.**—One quart of meal, four eggs, one pint of milk, half pint of water, tablespoonful butter. Beat the eggs thoroughly, add the milk, water, stir in the meal a little at a time, melt the butter before adding, add a little salt. Bake on a heated griddle. Very nice served with fried liver, for breakfast.

**Lemon Ginger Cakes.**—Quarter pound of butter, one-half pound of sugar, three eggs, one small cup of milk, the same quantity of molasses, three and a quarter pounds of flour, teaspoonful of ginger, one of cinnamon, one tablespoonful of saleratus dissolved in the milk, the rind of two lemons and the juice of one. Bake in a quick oven.

**Oyster Pie.**—Puff paste, oysters, cream butter, two eggs, cracker crumbs, pepper and salt. Roll out the puff paste, and cover the pie dish. Fill with bread-crusts, and cover with puff paste. Bake till the crust is done. Stew the oysters with the cream, butter, pepper and salt. When done, stir in very quickly, while on the fire, the two eggs well beaten, and one tablespoonful of cracker crumbs. Lift the top crust of the pie, empty the crusts out, pour in the oysters, cover, and serve very hot.
