Toronto: Market higher; moderate trading. Stocks lower; volume light.

Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market rallied in the last hour Thursday to avert a moderate decline and post an irregular advance amid the most active trading in two weeks.

Two copper stocks, Coldstream and Consolidated Halliwell, featured the mining section of the market by marching briskly ahead in heavy trading.

Base metals, off more than a point an hour before the end of the session, closed with a one-half-point gain. Western oils lost almost three-quarters of a point but were down 1 1/2 points earlier.

Noranda lost 1 1/2 points in senior base metals and International Nickel a point to hold back the section's index.

Consolidated West Pet. off 45 cents and Canadian Atlantic off 40 cents, were among the weaker western oils. West Mayfield lost 20 cents. Canadian Prospects added 15 cents and Trial 20 cents.
