Russian Reds Take New Look At Both Stalin, Khrushchev

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union will never return to Stalinism or Khrushchevism because the evils of both "have been resolutely thrown away," a party leader said Wednesday. Nikolai G. Yegorychev, head of the Moscow party organization, gave the assurances at the second day's session of the Soviet Communist party's 23rd congress.

Holding one of the highest positions in the Soviet power complex, Yegorychev obviously was laying down the official Kremlin line.

His mention of Joseph Stalin and Nikita S. Khrushchev could be the beginning of a re-evaluation of the two leaders during the congress. Communist sources had said this would happen.

WILL SHUN PAST
"The cult of personality, violations of Leninist norms and the principles of party life, socialist law—all that hindered our movement forward—have been resolutely thrown

away by the party and it will never return to the past," Yegorychev said.

The terms are those which have been used here to label both Stalin and Khrushchev. Yegorychev specifically mentioned "Stalinism" but avoided direct references to Khrushchev.

The appraisal of the two Soviet leaders appeared to be one of the major issues before the congress, the first to be held since Khrushchev's ouster in October, 1964.

Yegorychev was careful to distinguish between Stalin and Khrushchev and the achievements made during their rule. These were credited to the Communist party.

TO PRESERVE HISTORY
"The party also resolutely rejects any attempts to cross out the heroic history of our people who, under the guidance of the party, for almost a half-century have passed a difficult but glorious way of struggle and victories," Yegorychev said. "Now we see that something

could have been done better since 50 years have taught us much. But what has been done fills the hearts of the Soviet people with pride and amazes our friends in the entire world."

Trying to distinguish between the party and the two men who dominated it for 40 years could be a tricky business. Both Stalin and Khrushchev both undoubtedly still have their defenders within the Communist party.

WHITE COLLARS DOMINANT

MOSCOW (Reuters) — The Soviet Communist party, although known as the "party of the proletariat," is still dominated by white-collar workers and other groups normally associated with the middle class. In his report to the party's 23rd congress Tuesday, First Secretary Leonid Brezhnev disclosed that clerks, technicians and professional persons make up 46 per cent of the total membership of 12,741,000. Manual workers form only 37.8 per cent and peasants accounted for 16.2 per cent.

Flood Peak Due Shortly On Red River

WINNIPEG (CP) — The Red River edged upward at a slow crawl Wednesday and Agriculture Minister George Hutton of Manitoba said next week will be a "critical period" in this spring's flood picture.

With the melt speeding up under the influence of daytime temperatures in the 50s and 60s, Mr. Hutton said rain during that period could have serious effects.

In the five-day weather outlook, however, only moderate precipitation is foreseen.

The Red's watershed, extending deep into Minnesota and with many tributaries in that state and neighboring North Dakota, still has substantial snow cover.

The river remained ice-covered from Winnipeg to Grand Forks, N.D., 140 miles to the south, although it was broken around the edges as the slowly-swelling river lifted it upwards.

Predictions were unchanged for a high-water mark of 26 to 29 feet above winter average ice level, compared with 30.3 feet in the 1950 disaster, at Winnipeg between April 13 and 22.

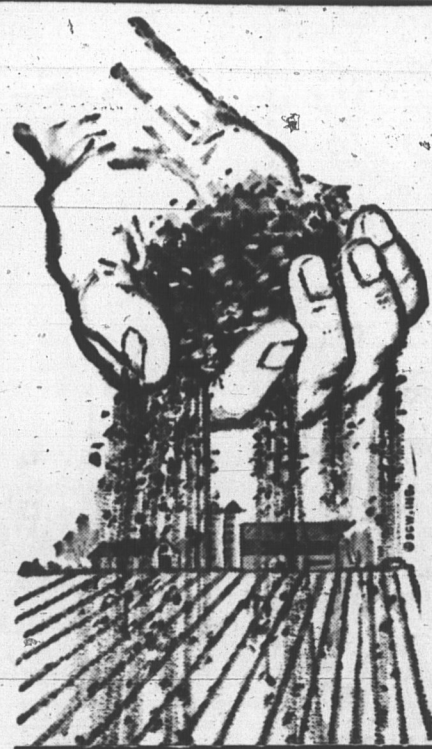
