GUARD OF HONOR.—The guard of honor detailed to meet His Honor the Lieut. Governor on his attending to open the Provincial Legislature on Thursday next, will be made up as follows: Garrison Artillery—1 captain, 1 sergeant, and 15 gunners; Engineers—1 2nd lieutenant, 1 sergeant, and 15 sappers; 82nd Battalion—1 1st lieutenant, 1 sergeant-major, 1 sergeant, and 70 privates. The guard will be under the command of Capt. H. McL. Davison, No. 1 G. A.

A SAD ACCIDENT.—Some children were playing hide and seek at Wardville, Ont., a few days ago, when one of them, Ella Crandall, aged four, secreted herself in an old-fashioned churn. Her mother came to scald out the churn, and poured a kettle of boiling water through the hole in the lid. A piercing shriek from the little one told Mrs. Crandall what had been done. The child was terribly scalded, and lived but a minute after being taken out. The mother is distracted, and believes that her experience was an ugly dream.

'T WAS NO JOKE AFTER ALL.—On Saturday night last, between half-past nine and ten o'clock, the residents of Pownal were alarmed at hearing shouts coming from the direction of the ice in the bay. Thinking that the cries were made by some persons who had broken through the ice, several men turned out with lanterns and ropes; but after making diligent search they failed to find anyone on or about the ice. On the following morning it was discovered that the noise which so alarmed the neighborhood was made by the village pedagogue and a companion named Vissey, who were out on a lark—and in this way tried to have some fun with their neighbors. They have probably learned, ere this, that there was not half so much fun in their little joke as they thought there would be, and it will likely be some time before it will be repeated.

STABBING AFFRAY.—A recent letter from St. Peter's Bay gives some particulars of a stabbing affray which occurred at that place on the 23rd ult., but which for some reason or another has not yet been brought before the courts. It appears that on that day two residents of the place were going along the road on their way to prayer meeting, when some boys began snow-balling them. A snowball struck one of these persons in the eye and he ran after the boy who threw it, and upon catching him hit him with his hand. After being hit the lad drew a knife and stabbed his assailant in the breast through two coats and two plaits of his handkerchief, and in two places on the arm, cutting him severely on the muscles through two heavy coat sleeves and two woolen shirts. The father of the person stabbed, it is stated, went to take the law of the boy, but so far nothing has come out of the matter. The authorities will likely enquire into the facts of the case, and see that justice is done all concerned.

SERIOUS AFFRAY.—Margaret Lisle Shepherd, nee Miss Herbert, well-known in Charlottetown from her connection with the defunct Gospel Army, is still posing as a "converted nun" in the United States. At latest accounts she was "doing" Pennsylvania. Here is what occurred at one of her recent lectures in York, as related in a despatch of the 19th: Mrs. Margaret Shepherd, of Boston, lectured here yesterday and last night, on the Roman Catholic Church. The woman professes to be a converted Romanist. On leaving the hall, accompanied by her husband, last night, she was hit by a stone thrown by Victor Segner. She was stunned and badly frightened. The force of the stone was broken by a knot of ribbons on her hat. Policemen Wire and Trust chased Segner, but the former sprained his ankle. Truett, after calling on Segner to stop without effect, shot at him, the ball hitting him in the left side and coming out near the heart. It is not known how serious the wound is.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, March 24. A North-west delegation is here urging the Government to pay the expenses of 20 British farmers to Canada this year to report on the resources of the territory.

The Senate to-day gave leave to Sir D. vid McPherson to attend the Rykert committee and give evidence.

Mr. Perley will move the adjournment of the Senate on Thursday until April 15. Mr. Miller made a vigorous kick to-day against the Government not giving the Upper House work to do. He said he was tired of being asked to assemble simply for the purpose of saying his prayers.

The Company Wins. OTTAWA, March 24. In the case of the Montreal and European Short Line Railway Company vs. The Queen, in which the Company claimed damages by reason of the expropriation of their road-bed by the Dominion Government, for the purpose of the Oxford and New Glasgow railway, Judge Burbridge, this morning, delivered judgment, awarding the Company \$117,000.68, with interest thereon from the 1st day of July, 1887. This sum is ordered to be paid to the Company in addition to the sum of \$140,000 paid on their account by the Government to the sub-contractors of the company some years ago.

Students Arrested. LONDON, March 24. Despatches from Russia in regard to the agitation among university students are confused and conflicting. Later despatches seem to make it clear that the agitation started at the Agricultural Academy at Petropawskoi, near Moscow. In spite of the strict precautions taken by the Government the agitation spread to other institutions. Students have been holding meetings at all the universities. There is a great upheaval of the students. Nine hundred have been arrested.

Toronto Tidings. TORONTO, March 24. Moffat pleaded guilty to the charge of larceny from the Ontario Bank, and he has been remanded for sentence, pending which he will be allowed to offer an explanation of the transaction, which is the subject of the trial.

The University library subscription fund amounts to \$4,273.

Hon. L. H. Davies, M. P., is spending a short parliamentary holiday in Toronto as the guest of W. Mulock, M. P.

Irish Land Bill. LONDON, March 23. In the House of Commons to-night, Balfour, Secretary for Ireland, introduced a bill for the purchase of land in Ireland and for the improvement of poorer and more congested districts. The bill also provides for the establishment of an Irish Land Department. The bill passed the first reading.

The German Policy. BERLIN, March 24. It is stated there will be no change in the German policy as regards the triple alliance. Chancellor Von Caprivi has addressed a note to the German Ambassador abroad in which he intimates that he will continue the policy of Bismarck.

Lizzie Stewart Still Missing.

AN ADJOURNMENT GRANTED Until All-Fool's Day.

It was after eleven o'clock this forenoon when Mrs. Weeks entered the court room, accompanied by her brother. She seemed to be in good health and spirits. The attendance of spectators was comparatively small.

Attorney-General McLeod intimated to the court that Lizzie Stewart, the missing witness in the case, had not yet been found. Since his return to the province, redoubled efforts had been made to find her, and he had strong hopes of being able to secure her within a week. He, therefore, asked that the case be adjourned for one week longer.

Mr. Peters objected to any further postponement. However, he said the matter was in the hands of the Magistrate.

The Magistrate said that as long as there was any reasonable probability of the witness being found and brought here, he saw no objection to a postponement.

Mr. Peters remarked that as the examination was only a preliminary one, he could not see the necessity for so many postponements.

The Attorney-General again requested a postponement. He said that if this case terminated now, a new prosecution would have to be commenced and the whole case would have to be gone over again. Besides, he said, a witness could not be searched for if a prosecution were not pending.

The Magistrate said he would grant a postponement until this day week. Bail was then received, the Court was cleared, and another act in the drama was brought to a close.
