Boat-Building And Furniture Plant Booking Despite Fire

Weymouth, N.S. (CP) - A boat-building and furniture plant here looks forward to expansion next year after coming face to face with closure 10 months ago.

New company manager L. C. Ruby predicts bigger and better things for the boat department, which this year exported 300 outboard units to central Canada and the eastern United States.

The boat market is booming closer to home, Mr. Ruby says. He described the interest in Nova Scotia this year as "amazing."

Upholstered furniture, the company's other major line, is sold almost entirely on the local market.

A new metal building, rented from the provincial crown organization Industrial Estates Limited, was opened Nov. 1 by premier Stanfield.

The firm's 100-man labor force offered to work without wages at rebuilding the plant. Local Boy Scouts handed over their meeting hall for boat construction, and Emilie Robicheau rented her wood mill to the company for \$11 a month, \$10 for equipment and \$1 for the building.
