MEASLES PREVALENT.—Measles are said to be very prevalent in some parts of the country districts in New Brunswick. At Berry's Mills the school has been closed for a time past on account of the prevalence of the disease, but has now reopened again. At Lutes Mountain the school was closed down on Thursday on the same account. The disease is confined principally to the children, though some grown up people are ill with the malady. No deaths have occurred in these sections so far from this disease.

SHARP INSURANCE MEN.—A deputation of insurance men recently visited Ottawa to urge upon the government the licensing of insurance solicitors. The visit and the subject broached caused no comment at the time, and apparently seemed to have passed into oblivion. However upon subsequent enquiry it was found that the insurance men, under cover of an apparently innocent regulation for safeguarding their interests, hope, if their suggestion is adopted by the government, to wipe out of existence all fraternal assessment insurance associations now doing business in Canada.

A TIMELY MOVE.—We understand that the police are now busy making a special report of all dogs in the city. The Magistrate is doing this as constant complaints are being made of the dog nuisance. As soon as this report is in, section 10 of the city by law will be enforced to the tune of possibly 500 dogs—a good riddance. This section authorizes the police to destroy any dog at large without a collar. They have secured for a consideration the services of two boys, who undertake to bring in from ten to twenty dogs per day, when the dogs will be shot without further notice. Some such drastic measure is absolutely necessary. Owners in the meantime can protect with collars, with name affixed, any valuable dogs.

FOGGED BY GREEN GOODS MEN.—A Gentleman, inspector of Canadian Customs at Rouse's Point N. Y., a few days ago noticed a couple of young men on the station platform at that point carrying a small parcel. They demurred at allowing him to examine the box in his official capacity, but as he threatened to remove it from them and forward to Canada in bond, they at last consented. The box, on being opened, was found to contain nothing but a brick. Then the men told how they had been duped, misled by "green goods" circulars. Ten of them, all belonging in the vicinity of Montreal, had subscribed \$100 each and for this they were to receive \$5,000 in "new crisp bills." The box was handed to them at Rouse's Point by an individual who immediately left on the outgoing train. Before leaving, however, he assured the men that the box contained \$5,000. The verdant countrymen are just on \$1,000, in return for which they have nothing to show but bricks.
