The Lord High Chancellor's Resignation.

LONDON, Nov. 16. It is reported that Lord Selborne, Lord High Chancellor of England, is about to resign.

The Ottoman Commissioner.

LONDON, Nov. 16. The British Government has definitely declined to entertain the renewed proposal of the Porte to despatch Sevar Pasha to Egypt as Ottoman Commissioner.

The Westphalia Disaster.—Lost with all Hands.

LONDON, Nov. 16. The crew of the life-boat which was launched from the Hamburg, American steamer, "Westphalia" after the collision, off the Isle of Wight, was landed by a Belgian pilot boat at New Haven, yesterday. They report seeing the steamer which collided with the "Westphalia" sink with all hands. They think she is a vessel of the same line, named the "Netherlands."

Procedure Resolutions.

LONDON, Nov. 16. In the Commons, last night, the debate on the second procedure resolution was concluded. Mr. Gladstone assented, though with much misgiving, he said, to the amendment providing that a member may obtain leave to move an adjournment during the pending of questions, provided forty members rise in their places and favor such motion. The second rule after a stormy debate passed.

The False Prophet's Lieutenant Killed.

CAIRO, Nov. 16. A Lieutenant of the False Prophet, El Medhi, was captured by the Egyptian troops yesterday and was promptly hanged.

The Joyce Murderers to be Executed.

DUBLIN, Nov. 16. The prisoner who turned Queen's evidence gave a lengthy description of the massacre in court yesterday. The case went to the jury shortly afterwards, and a verdict of "guilty" was quickly returned. The Judge then pronounced the sentence of death, hanging to take place on the 15th of December next.

[The prisoners are Patrick Joyce (Shanvachill), Patrick Joyce (John), Thomas Joyce (Pat), Michael Casey, Thomas Casey, John Casey, Martin Joyce, Myles Joyce, and Anthony Philbin. Their ages vary from thirty to forty years. At the preliminary hearing they were comfortably dressed in suits of new dark gray frieze, and appeared to be of the better class of small farmers. They all have long hair and beards. As the clerk of the court read out each name, the prisoner held up his left hand and uttered some words in Irish. The Clerk of the Crown having arraigned them in the usual form and asked them were they guilty or not guilty of the murder of John Joyce the prisoners remained silent and counsel informed the Court that they did not know English. The interpreter having been then sworn by direction of the Court the question was repeated and they each pleaded "Not guilty." They were then indicted for the murder of the Joyce family—namely, Michael Joyce, Bridget Joyce, Margaret Joyce, Sr., and Margaret Joyce, Jr. All the accused pleaded "Not guilty."

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 14. Lord Randolph Churchill has placed fifty new amendments to the procedure rules on the paper.

The Commons committee, on the case of the imprisonment of Mr. Gray, met, today, to consider its reports. It is understood that there will be presented three reports. The first, favored by the majority of the committee, states that Judge Lawson acted within his jurisdiction in imprisoning Mr. Gray; the second by Mr. Dillwyn, remarks upon the present state of the law of contempt; third, by the Irish members of the committee, which suggests certain alterations of the law and reflects upon the conduct of Judge Lawson.

After some discussion the committee decided that there was no occasion for the Commons to take further notice of the matter.

PORTSMOUTH, Nov. 14. It is now the general idea that the steamer which collided with the Westphalia made off so as to avoid giving her name. There are no tidings of the Westphalia's boat.

LONDON, Nov. 14. The channel pilot who landed at Falmouth today, reports that a boat, doubtless the one sent by the Westphalia in search of the steamer, was passed 20 miles east by northeast of Beachy Head at 11 this a.m.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 14. The British steamship Royal Walsh, with 4,000 bales of cotton for Barcelona, got ashore on the breakers of the bar this forenoon. She will probably be hauled off at high water.

DUBLIN, Nov. 13. One of the prisoners charged with being implicated in the massacre of the Joyce family has turned Queen's evidence. He will depose that he accompanied his fellow prisoners to the residence of the Joyces, and that, while he waited outside the house, he heard the shrieks of the victims within.

DUBLIN, Nov. 14. The arrest yesterday of a man for alleged participation in the Joyce family murder took place at Congo. It was made in consequence of information given by the approver in the case of the Joyce massacre.

LONDON, Nov. 14. Mr. Yorke will today in the Commons move the appointment of a select committee of inquiry on the subject of the alleged "Kilmahony treaty" to which, reference was made in the House last evening.

Arabi has written to the Times declaring that the late war carried on by him was in accordance with the laws of God and man, and consistent with the solemn decree of a Council under the presidency of the Khedive and Derwish Pasha. The letter concludes with a protest against Egyptians being deprived of every office in favor of foreigners.

PARIS, Nov. 14. Figaro publishes a special from Cairo stating that the English and French Governments have come to an understanding in regard to Egypt. England, as compensation for the abolition of dual control, offers France the presidency of the public debt commission, which M. Bredif will assume. Other questions concerning the organization of Egypt will be treated in concert with all the European powers whose approval Gladstone believes assured. Figaro is of doubtful authority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14. A London despatch says the steamer Angelica, bound from Gelfo, Sweden, to Hull, England, foundered in the North Sea. Forty persons were drowned.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 14. According to latest advices the wreck recently seen off the Siberian coast was not that of the Danish exploring vessel, as first reported, but that of a trading vessel abandoned last year.

LONDON, Nov. 14. The Times' Paris correspondent says Spain is inclined to treat Cuban refugees as political offenders, and to indemnify their families.

PARIS, Nov. 14. The Parliament (?) commenting on the recapture of Cuban refugees by Spanish authorities says: "This abuse of power will not conduce to restore the damaged prestige of Sagasta, the Spanish Prime Minister, in the ranks of Liberals."

VIENNA, Nov. 14. The man Horwarth, at whose house in Little Pesth a number of explosives were found, has been released, as he is the inventor of bombs which he offered to sell to the Minister of War. The military tribunal at Trieste has confirmed the sentence of death passed upon Overdank, the bomb manufacturer.

PESTH, Nov. 14. A riot occurred at Arad during an election there yesterday. The mob smashed the windows of the town hall and seriously wounded the commander of troops which had been sent to suppress the disturbance. The soldiers dispersed the crowd with their bayonets, seriously wounding twenty persons.

PARIS, Nov. 14. The trial of the directors of the Union Generale will commence 5th December.

LONDON, Nov. 14. The Times' Paris correspondent says the anarchists arrested at Lyons have been committed for trial. The preliminary investigation showed the existence of a scheme for partial rising at various points to pave the way for a general outbreak.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 14. A telegram from Nerstchinsk states that a prairie fire raged on the Mongolian frontier in October, covering 70 square miles and consuming a number of Cossack outposts and villages.

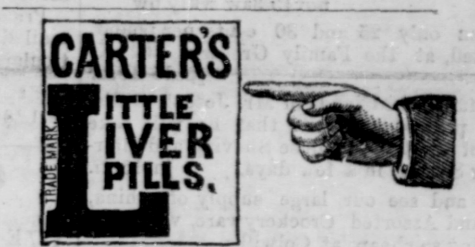
