Baccalaureate Sermon Delivered To Graduates

"How fitting it is that you should begin your commencement exercises in your beautiful chapel, at the feet of Him who has as often nourished your souls in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and by the reception of Holy Communion. Day after day you have knelt in His Divine presence, and learned from Him, the most sublime of all teachers, that He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life."

Thus, in the course of his sermon yesterday morning, did Rev. Vincent J. Murphy guest preacher at the Baccalaureate Mass of St. Dunstan's University refer to the appropriateness of this manner of opening the annual commencement exercises.

Appropriateness seemed to mark every detail connected with the occasion, as delightful weather, pleasant surroundings, an

excellent attendance of friends of the graduates and of the institution, the joyous pageantry of the Solemn High Mass itself, the uplifting harmony of the university choir directed by Reverend Adrian Arsenault, and the concluding note of delicious buffet dinner enjoyed by all present, contributed to make the event one that will surely shine in the memories of the graduates.

The celebrant of the Solemn High Mass was a classmate of Father Murphy at St. Dunstan's, Right Reverend Monsignor John A. Sullivan, President of the University assisted by Rev. William Simpson as deacon, and Rev. Francis Cameron as sub-deacon. Present in the sanctuary was Right Rev. Monsignor J. A. Murphy, Vicar-General of the diocese and a former teacher of Father Murphy at St. Dunstan's.

It was in this familiar setting, which he did not fail to remark upon, that the speaker addressed his remarks.

It was a blend of ripe learning, great sincerity, deep affection for great gratitude to his alma mater that lent such unmistakable effect to the speaker's words as he urged upon his hearers that: "This is a poor education which trains the mind to know what is true, but does not train the will to embrace what is right" and again that: "Man was made by God for God. In that simple sentence is summed up the true philosophy of life. All the errors and blunders which creep into educational methods can be infallibly traced to the omission of the fundamental principle of life—Man is made by God for God."

The graduates have been given a clear and complete explanation of the things that made their a truly privileged preparation for life, and an inspiring exhortation to live up to that preparation, when Father Murphy had delivered his closing words: "Be loyal to your Alma Mater, who ever faithful to her glorious motto: Ex eodem fonte fides et scientia sendis you forth well trained in worldly knowledge, but above all in the changeless truths of our holy faith. And may it always be St. Dunstan's joy to be able to say of you, the graduates of '59, what St. John the Apostle said of his faithful followers: 'I have no greater joy than this, to hear that my children walk in truth'."

Union Educational Program Is Vital, Speaker Declares

The educational program now being carried on by Canadian Trade Union movement is of the most importance, not only to ourselves but to the entire Canadian development", F. D. Nichol, said in addressing a dinner setting of the Charlottetown and District Labor Council Saturday night at the Charlottetown Hotel Saturday night.

The meeting, with more than 100 members and their wives attendance, was a highlight in a week-end institute at Prince Wales College, and presided over by Harold Gaudet.

Mr. Nichol continued "Union democracy means full rights and freedom to dissent—to criticize—oppose, and it means that decisions must be made and executed at the express desires of the rank and file.

"The right to choose unwisely, which is prevalent today, is a real problem", he said and "because of a reluctance to think, there is a creeping and growing difference, with a tendency to give up all difficult problems, problems which will be solved by others, if not by us."

Describing the struggle today for "men's minds", Mr. Nichol stressed the place of unionism with all that it entails—rights—freedoms—brotherhood of man.

"Through collective organization, the interests of individuals will not be subjugated to the will of employer or government at any level", he affirmed.

High Average Award Is Captured By RSS

Attaining the highest average in all entries in the 1959 Festival of Music, Rochford Square School was presented with the Gyro Shield at the "Stars" of the Festival concert, held at Birchwood High School Saturday evening. This was the second year in a row that the school has been awarded the shield.
