Farmer Says Debt Less Than Appears

On a question of privilege, Provincial Treasurer Alban Farmer rose in the Legislature yesterday to correct what he said was a wrong statement regarding the provincial debt in an editorial reference in yesterday's Guardian.

The editorial read in part: "Mr. Farmer produced a consolidated balance sheet showing an outstanding debt of over \$51 million."

Mr. Farmer said that credits amounting to \$11,821,341, as shown in the balance sheet should be subtracted from the \$51 million debt. He said this would leave a debt, as of March 31, 1964, of \$39,095,339.

The \$11,821,341 are described as "recoverable assets" in Mr. Farmer's budget which was presented Thursday night in the Legislature.

Noted Island Weaver Dies Of Illness At 55

Mrs. F. Bayfield Ellis, 47 Peake Street, Charlottetown, died Thursday night in the Prince Edward Island Hospital where she had been a patient since Christmas night, 1964. She was in her 56th year.

The former Gladys Wright of Bedeque was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wright. She married Mr. Ellis in 1928 and they lived in O'Leary until 1952 when they moved to Charlottetown where her husband was on the staff of the fruit and vegetable division, Canada department of Agriculture and later became district inspector. She had taught school in earlier life.

Mrs. Ellis was a most talented lady. She was a life member of the Prince Edward Island Art Society and for some years she was a member of the executive of the Maritime Art Society.

Mrs. Ellis began to paint when she was a patient in the Provincial Sanatorium 18 years ago, and she did portrait as well as landscape paintings.

But it was her weaving that possibly brought her the greatest fame. Last summer, for example, she supplied beautiful woven articles of many kinds, to more than one-half dozen tourist gift shops.

Her Elliscraft woven materials have been on the market for several years.

EVENING GOWN

The beautiful evening gown Mrs. Ellis wore to the Royal Variety Performance here last October during the visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth was woven and made by her, and she received several orders for similar material the following day.

The material of the dress was white with a metallic gold thread running through it.

Mrs. Ellis patented three of her special designs which included the Confederation tartan and the Garden of the Gulf tartan, which is being manufactured on contract into 10 different types of ladies wear by a well-known Montreal firm and is expected to come on the market early this year. The contract called for royalties to the designer.

Mrs. Ellis was the first to suggest a cultural centre be built on the Market Square and she called on the City Council with the idea the morning of April 30, 1958. The old Market Building had been destroyed by a fire that had broken out shortly before midnight the previous night.

Mrs. Ellis was a member of Trinity United Church and of the Rebekah lodge here in Charlottetown.

Robert Grindlay (P.C. - 2nd Prince) said he supported the repeal bill as a matter of principle. He said "people in this province are now legally denied the right to buy a perfectly wholesome food."

Keith Harrington (P.C. - 3rd Prince) was for the bill, saying he doesn't believe in any law "that denies the right of the individual." He said "we can't make laws for the gain of a few at the expense of others."

Highways Minister Philip Matheson saw some value to the dairy industry in maintaining the ban on margarine. He said he could not support the repeal.

BLAMES MINISTER A.W. Matheson (L-4th Kings) blamed Attorney General Alban Farmer for "the crisis here today." Mr. Matheson maintained that if the attorney-general had enforced the margarine ban law or had gotten a Supreme Court ruling on the validity of the law, it would not be necessary to bring the repeal bill in.

Mr. Farmer said there is "no sympathy for the present bill" and no complaints of infractions had been made.

Mr. Matheson asked "what good is a law the government won't enforce." He said he would be fair and vote for repeal because of the way the act was administered during the past five years.

Liberals George MacKay (4th Prince) and Robert Campbell (1st Prince) both said they were "amazed" that the minister of agriculture would let the repeal bill reach the floor of the house.

Patient Average Lowest Here Says Report To Hospital Ass'n

Prince Edward Island has the lowest average percentage of hospital patients in Canada and in 1961 10.4 per cent of the hospitalized were 65 years old and over. It was noted in a report at a recent meeting of 12 directors of the Hospital Association of P.E.I.

Between 1960-1962 Prince Edward Island led the nation with a 99.4 per cent average of births in hospitals. The average length of maternity stay for the female age groups 15-24 and 25-44 years were close to or equal to the lowest in Canada.

Of eight reporting provinces in 1962, Prince Edward Island, recorded the highest discharge rates for diabetes mellitus and pneumonia, for diseases of the circulatory system generally, and for arteriosclerosis and degenerative heart diseases in particular. The total discharges in these cases represented the highest percentages of any reporting province, said the report.

A suggestion from the Prince County Hospital Board for a "hospital fire marshal" who would be responsible for fire prevention and protection programs in all Island hospitals would be deferred until all hospitals have made a request for such a service, it was agreed.

SALARY SCALE The salary range committee is expected to present a report on a project of compiling a set of job classifications and a salary scale for the general hospitals at the annual meeting, May 12.

With the approval of the Hospital Service Commission, hospital personnel now have nine specific statutory holidays as well as time off for voting on election day.

Hospital personnel are eligible for sick leave after six consecutive months of employment, and their accumulated sick leave is retroactive to the date of employment. Sick leave accumulates at the rate of 1/4 days per full month of service to a maximum of 100 working days, the report said.

The Canadian Hospital Association's new extension-type correspondence course in departmental management is expected to start in the fall of 1965. The deadline for receiving applications in June 30. Prospective applicants for the C.H.A. Course in hospital organization and man-

agement were reminded at the meeting that application should be in before March 15.

John P. O'Connor Of City Dies Suddenly In S'ide

The sudden death in Summerside Thursday night of John Patrick O'Connor, 23 Moreau Drive, Charlottetown, shocked a wide circle of friends in the city as well as throughout the province where he was widely known in the fisheries industry.

Mr. O'Connor was found dead in a bed in a room at approximately 8:30 p.m. Thursday, Prince County Coroner, Dr. Marvin Clark ordered an autopsy which was performed yesterday afternoon.

A police spokesman stated that there was no suspicious circumstances and Dr. Clark stated he didn't think there would be any inquest.

The late Mr. O'Connor until recently had been connected with the provincial department of fisheries and the Fishermen's Loan Board and his duties brought him into contact with fishermen in all parts of the Island. He had been at Alberton in connection with the seal hunt first of last week. Quiet and soft-spoken, his personality won him friend in all fields of his endeavors and made him admired by all who knew him.

A native of Hope River, he was son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. O'Connor of that village, and received his early education there before entering Saint Dunstan's University. In 1952 he graduated from St. Francis Xavier University with his degree of Bachelor of Commerce. Married that same year to the former Audrey Lund, Charlottetown, he entered the RCAF and served five years in Ottawa, London, Whitehorse and Edmonton.

On receiving his discharge he returned to this province. He went into business for himself but left it to move to this city. His first government service
