## ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Toronto Globe: Lord Roberts will probably be strong enough and humane enough to resist the jingoes in London who are calling for "sterner measures" for the termination of the war in South Africa. The Boers' fight for independence may be foolish and hopeless, but that does not make it criminal. Of course, where there is actual crime it must be punished, but the mere continuance of resistance would not warrant the destruction of farm houses and other acts advocated by the sterner gentlemen of the clubs and music halls.

Montreal Star: Those of the Liberal party who look with hope and confidence to Quebec to help the Laurier party out of difficulty will find themselves sadly mistaken. The party has violated every pledge that was made before the last election, exploited many of the possibilities in the way of corruption, been extravagant, wasteful, dishonest. The proud name of Liberal meant so much in days gone by, to people who believed in Mackenzie and Blake and Dorion; a party which had leaders who, whether their views on political economy were sound or not, had fixed principles and were prepared to stand or fall by them. Today that old party name is indelibly associated with scandals which bring the blush of shame to every honest Canadian face.

Montreal Star: The ability to express fluently one's thoughts is a natural gift that is worthy of cultivation, but let us always remember that a great statesman need not be a great orator; that the greatest truths are often conveyed in the fewest words; and he who is slow to promise may be quick to perform. In the approaching campaign beware of words, words, idle words; beware of the men whose records are unsavory, though their speech is full of fragrance; beware of the "silver-tongued orator" whose actions belie his talk. The time has come when the hard-headed, thoughtful men of this country should assert themselves; demand integrity in high places, honesty of administration, economy in public expenditure, dismissal of those who have wronged the people by false promises, interfered with the best interests of the country by foolish waste of great opportunities, disgraced the nation by practising or condoning the most flagrant corruption. It is time for action, not oratory; for putting forward sturdy men of sound principles, not listening to glib actors recite pretty speeches.

## PATENT COMMISSIONER'S

### REPORT.

The annual report of the U. S. Commissioner of Patents, Hon. Charles H. Duell, has been submitted to the Secretary of the Interior. During the past fiscal year there were received 39,815 applications for mechanical patents, 2,263 applications for designs, 90 applications for reissue, 1,739 caveats and 127 applications for prints. There were 26,540 patents granted including reissues and designs; 1,600 trade marks, 682 labels and 93 prints were registered. The number of patents that expired were 19,988. The total receipts of the office were \$1,358,228.35, total expenditures were \$1,247,827.58 and the surplus of receipts over expenditures, being the amount turned over to the treasury, was \$110,400.77.

The examination work of the office is in about the same relative condition that it was at the close of the fiscal year ended June 30th, 1899. At that time every examiner had his new work within one month from date of filing and his amended work within fifteen days of date. At the close of the present fiscal year, thirty out of the thirty-six examiners had their new work within one month from the date of filing. Of the remaining six, three overran that time but by one day. The amended work in nearly all of the divisions was being acted upon within fifteen days after filing. The number of applications awaiting action on the part of office on 1st July, 1900, was between five and six hundred more than on the 1st July, 1899, but the number of applications for patents, etc., received during the last fiscal year was 5,000 greater than during the preceding year, and the number of amendments acted upon was correspondingly greater.

This is considered an excellent showing, and reflects credit upon the examining corps, when it is borne in mind that a greater number of examiners were detailed for classification work than during the preceding fiscal year.

## ISLANDER'S DEATH.

We take the following from the Montanaineer, of Marysville, Montana, dated July 26th:

"Again death has visited Marysville and taken one of her most respected and worthy citizens, Robert D. McLean, aged 54 years, who died in Marysville, Saturday, July 21st.

"Mr. McLean had been a great sufferer during his recent illness, but all that medical aid and willing hand and loving hearts could do availed as nothing. He was a man whom every one honored and respected, and his loss will be greatly felt among those who knew him best. He leaves a wife and daughter, Mrs. S. E. Bowlby, who keenly feel their loss.

"Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, after which the remains were taken to Helena, accompanied by a large number of townspeople, including members of the United Moderns. Upon their arrival in Helena they were met by friends from that city, East Helena, Butte and San Francisco, who proceeded with them to the cemetery."

The above Robert D. McLean was the second son of the late Hugh McLean, merchant, of St. Peter's Bay, at which place his mother, brother and two sisters still reside. Mrs. Robert D. McCallum, of Boston, Mass., and Mrs. W. P. Goff, of Dayton, N. D., are also sisters of the deceased.

## A Very Human Touch.

The speeches in the British parliament upon the occasion of the assassination of King Humbert were not so felicitously expressed as on like occasions in Gladstone's day. So noteworthy was this that the London Daily Mail observes, "The art of such ceremonious speaking as is required for a funeral orator died with Mr. Gladstone."

There was, however, says the Mail, "just one very human touch in the speech of Lord Salisbury, which added greatly to the impressiveness of the occasion and communicated a certain sympathetic thrill to his audience. He came to speak of the Queen of Italy—that noble and bereaved figure which has appealed so strongly to the sympathy of the entire world. Suddenly Lord Salisbury paused, and his voice seemed to choke; and amid the thrilled, painful and expectant silence at this sudden breakdown in one so extraordinarily self-composed, people perceived that Lord Salisbury, the man and the widower, was suddenly brought face to face with his own great sorrow. It was one of those quick and unusual revelations of inner character and profound feeling which from a proud and reserved man are very impressive, and so it was felt."

## The Natural Limit of Pain.

A famous Belgian surgeon stated recently that he thought suffering could not pass a certain limit, and that most of us had reached the limit when having a tooth drawn. "I have been forced to the conclusion," he said, "that after a certain point a sort of stupefying insensibility to pain is produced in the patient, and he suffers no more; his nerves refuse to transmit any more acute sensations. Therefore, the horrifying stories of agony which have been written are purely efforts of the imagination."
