tural News. This observation was recently made at the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station where it was noticed that cattle preferred to graze in certain areas of a pasture and left untouched other sections containing succulent growths of grass.

Through chemical analysis, it was determined that grass which the cattle favored was higher in sugar content than the grass they passed up. The explanation given for this bovine "sweet tooth" was that cattle seemed to prefer pastures where the phosphorus content of the soil was fairly high and that plants high in phosphorus always contain more sugar than plants with a phosphorus deficiency.
