MONDAY

William MacDonald, 20, of Souris is in the Charlottetown Hospital with serious head injuries following a car accident last evening on Tea Hill.

It is reported that the car in which MacDonald was a passenger went out of control and rolled over several times. The accident is being investigated by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Settlement within two weeks along the lines of the ruling of the Arbitration Board in connection with the wages and working hours dispute has been insisted on in a letter forwarded from the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers to the Island Telephone Company, according to Mr. Arthur Holland, president of the local union, in a statement last night.

Mr. Holland said "Having fully complied with the laws of Prince Edward Island and exhausted all means of settlement otherwise, we have found ourselves forced to send a letter to the Island Telephone Company Limited insisting that they abide by the decision of the Arbitration Board within two weeks or the employees will refrain from work."

A Sabre jet from Chatham, N.B., visible only as a tiny speck more than seven miles high, was nosed toward the ground by its pilot and came zooming toward the earth at a speed of more than 760 miles per hour to give some 5,000 civilian spectators at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside on Air Force Day (Saturday) their first audio visual experience of an aircraft travelling at a speed faster than sound.

This was one of the many exhibits that thrilled the crowds who attended the three hour display program featured by the R. C. A. F. in the annual observance of Air Force Day.

Expertly prepared ground displays that covered almost every phase of air force work and recreation, together with aerial displays by jet aircraft and fly pasts by propeller-driven types, representing the smaller sized Expeditor, the medium sized Dakota and the large four-engine Lancaster aircraft were included on the program.

A valiant and successful fight against the ravages of an extreme case of polio is attributed to Conrad Dube, who arrived in Charlottetown yesterday after travelling upwards of five thousand miles on a bicycle.

Mr. Dube, who is now 24 years old, was stricken with polio when two years of age and was ten years old before he learned to walk, six years of which were spent in a plaster cast. At 16 he was able to talk but because of lack of schooling is unable to read or write. On the advice of doctors he took up wheeling in the hope that his muscles would be restored and strengthened and that his general health would also benefit. The success of the treatment may be realized when his long trip is considered and the fact that frequently he covered seventy miles in a day's pedalling.

TUESDAY

Mr. Roland MacDonald, Southport, has been appointed a member of the Prince Edward Island Milk Control Board as representative of the milk and cream producers and distributors, according to an announcement yesterday following a recent meeting of the Provincial Cabinet. Mr. MacDonald replaces Mr. C. Claude Smith who resigned because of other duties.

Arrangements were made yesterday at a special meeting of the Provincial Cabinet to permit the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers to take a vote by ballot and thereby ascertain the wishes of employees of the Island Telephone Company in the present wage and hour dispute between the union and the company.

A. W. Matheson, in announcing the decision of the Government yesterday, said that the terms and time of the vote would be fixed by the Provincial Secretary, Hon. William Hughes.

"That the unemployment situation in this Province is becoming a serious matter is pointed up by the fact that at the present time approximately 500 people are drawing unemployment insurance benefits through the local National Employment Office. This is almost twice the number drawing benefits at the same time last year.

Mr. Richard "Dick" MacDonald, Director of the Dominion Drama Festival, with headquarters at Ottawa, arrived in Charlottetown last evening to confer with Mr. Barry Bugden, regional director and governor of the festival, as well as the five other governors of the festival, namely, His Honor T. W. L. Prowse, T. D. DeBlois, T. Harry Morris, Mrs. Fred Gates, and Judge Palmer.

Mr. MacDonald, who is on a tour of Drama Festival Groups throughout Canada, has just completed his visit in Newfoundland, and is moving from east to west, right through to Vancouver. Because of the increased interest, he has 34 regions to visit this year, compared with 26 last years. Three years ago, there were only 20.

"One thing we might achieve through co-operation with the other Atlantic Provinces, and that is uniformity in text books as far as possible," said Hon. Walter E. Darby, Attorney General, in an address on Maritime Co-operation delivered at the Rotary Luncheon held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Darby, who based his remarks on several primary subjects under review by the Atlantic Provinces Premiers during their round

table discussion at Moncton last week, went on to say: "Here, we are tied up with text books as used in some other Provinces, which are changed too frequently and we are compelled to fall in line with the changes, even though we do not approve. If we could co-ordinate the Education Departments on matters of this kind, we should be able to reduce prices and avoid rapid changes.

"In this Province a major problem of co-ordination which would be practically impossible for the Government to overcome, is the scattered high-school system which New Brunswick enjoys," Mr. Darby said. "Books, grading and teachers would be difficult to arrange on a Maritime or Atlantic Province scale, especially with Newfoundland where they have denominational schools, and we would not care to dictate to them regarding a uniform curriculum."

WEDNESDAY

"The thirteenth annual provincial plowing match and livestock show gets underway at Dundas today and will continue through Thursday. The feature events of the 2-day program will be the plowing climax followed by the Esso provincial plowship class on Thursday, the first and second winners of which will represent the Province as a team in the all Canadian plowing match competition to be held in Coburg, Ontario in October. Last year Glen Morrissett of Cherry Valley won the feature event.

Mrs. Gaspard Arseneault of Howland Station is celebrating her 100th birthday today.

The former Catherine Wedge, she was born at Fortune Cove, September 23, 1853, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wedge, and is the only surviving member of a large family. As a girl she attended Miscouche Convent for three years. Since her marriage about 75 years ago she has lived at Howland.

"Had it not been for the heavy and continued rains during the past month, all records for road work in the Province would have been broken by now, but even yet with a break and some fine weather, we may reach the desired goal," said Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways yesterday.

"The sub-grading programme being carried out by our own men and the Province is nearly completed and generally speaking, the crews will be continued in the service at widening and cleaning projects," the Minister said.

The death of Mr. James Calder, formerly of Charlottetown, occurred in New Glasgow, N. S., on Monday evening. He was in his 77th year.

Mr. Calder, who for many years was engaged with his father in the tailoring and furrier business in Charlottetown, came to the Island when a boy of 12 years. Following the death of his father he continued in business here, eventually removing to Sydney, N. S., and finally to New Glasgow, N. S., where he has resided for upwards of ten years, conducting one of the foremost furrier establishments there.

The Calvert Trophy was presented last evening to Mr. Barry Bugden, Regional Director of the Drama Festival in Prince Edward Island, to be awarded to the winner of the best play at next year's festival.

Mr. Richard MacDonald, director of the Dominion Drama Festival, who made the presentation, addressed an interested and appreciative audience in the City Council chambers. Mr. Barry Bugden presided and introduced the speaker whom he described as one possessing a marvellous fund of knowledge of the drama which was available to all those interested.

The Charlottetown Hospital Bazaar opened its 19th annual bazaar last evening with a very large attendance at the Charlottetown Forum.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E., chief of the Hospital medical staff, in officially opening the Bazaar highly praised those who, year after year, give of their time and talent in this great charitable cause.

"You are doing the finest Christian work that can be done," he said. "You are helping, through your efforts, to pay the hospital bills of those who are financially unable to do so." Dr. MacMillan was warm in his praise for the Lads and Lassies Band whom he described as a credit to their city and to the Province.

Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, chairman and manager of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board was advised early yesterday afternoon by Canadian National Railways officials that, effective October 15th, refrigerator car charges on potatoes and other vegetables are being eliminated from the present tariff charges.

"This announcement, although not entirely unexpected," said Mr. MacDonald, "is indeed a source of satisfaction to Island potato growers and shippers. For upwards of forty years such special charges for refrigerator car services have existed, and until the present year any representations regarding their removal have been without result. However, last July in the general submission prepared by the Potato Marketing Board on behalf of the potato industry in this Province and New Brunswick, and presented to the Board of Transport Commissioners, the unfairness of this charge was fully emphasized and it was suggested that, while a formal complaint was not being made it was hoped that through the process of negotiation between the potato industry and Railway officials the requested relief might be obtained."

THURSDAY

The opening fall meeting last night of the West Kent Home and School Association heard very comprehensive reports of the Annual meeting of the Provincial Federation of Home and School Associations. Mrs. G. Moffatt reported fully on the afternoon business meeting and Mrs. J.P. Lantz gave a review of the address by the Canadian President Mr. G.F. Bruce.

Mrs. Ivan Nicholson and Miss G. Crosby were appointed as a membership committee.

A large number of interested participants in the growing drama movement throughout the Province last evening met Mr. Richard MacDonald, Dominion Drama Festival Director, at a delightfully informal gathering at Government House.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Prowse received the guests, and the hostess was assisted in the drawing rooms by Mrs. E. F. Greene, Mrs. J. A. Macmillan, Mrs. J. J. Connolly, Mrs. A. G. Macmillan, Mrs. A. W. Rogers, and Mrs. L. E. Prowse.

An effort to learn what is being done for handicapped children elsewhere will be made by the local Cerebral Palsy parents group of this city. At the regular meeting this week it was decided to write to parent groups in other centres and also to the various Provincial Government Departments of Health to ascertain what is being done for exceptional children in their Provinces.

The serious situation prevailing in the lobster fishing industry and the need for recommendations "designed to protect and conserve this valuable industry to the Maritime Provinces" is highlighted in a resolution passed yesterday at the eighth annual meeting of the P. E. Island Fisheries Federation. The resolution urges that the Fisheries Council of Canada, following consultation with the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia fishery associations, approach the Federal Department of Fisheries with a view to convening an early meeting of Federal and Maritime Provincial officials, together with representatives of fish packets and fishermen, for the purpose of reviewing this problem.

"A special meeting was held at Yeos' Theatre, Montague last evening to discuss proposed plans for the organization of a co-operative in Montague. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Charles Yeo, Lot 16.

Mr. J.G. Dennis, Charlottetown, supervisor of Island co-operatives, gave a brief resume of what had been accomplished up to the present. He said that following numerous requests from the district, the work of organizing a co-operative at Montague was begun. He stated that a considerable area had already been canvassed, and P. E. already over \$70,000 had been pledged. Meetings were held last week in New Perth, Valleyfield and Whim Road, and the response was most favorable.

He intended, he said, should the program go through, to open a modern up-to-date self service store in the property owned by Bergmann, dealing in groceries, fruits and meats. There would also be sufficient room for a feed warehouse, egg grading station and poultry room.

A roaring welcome was given to the World Guide Chief, Lady Baden-Powell, last evening at a rally held for Brownies and Girl Guides at 6 p.m. yesterday at the Community Centre.

"This international woman won the hearts of approximately 600 youngsters who came from all parts of Queens and Kings Counties to see her. She smiled her jolliest smiles and, thoughtful of youth's energy, had them 're-arrange' themselves before she talked to them, even showing them how to do it!

The children laughed with her and responded eagerly to her words which won their hearts. "I am delighted to be here with you—last time I was here, you were still in your cradles," she said, lowering her voice to its lowest pitch in the last word, "and I am 'three times lucky' to be here again and carry this memory to Brownies and Guides in other lands."

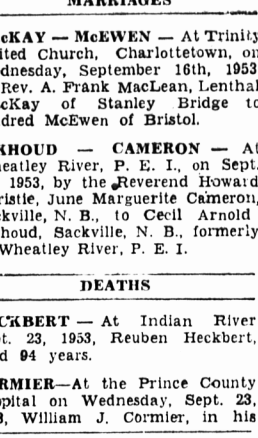
