STILL ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT IN LOCAL EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

The National Employment Office in Charlottetown reports a slight decrease in the number of men employed on construction work in the City of Charlottetown, during the past two weeks.

The new Motel located on the Malpeque Road about a mile from the city outskirts, is completed and a number of carpenters have been laid off. An unusual large number of men have been employed on the Motel in an endeavour to rush it to completion at the earliest moment.

At present fewer men are being employed on the T. Eaton Building on Kent Street, than will be employed a few weeks hence when the work is farther advanced. The building is not yet enclosed.

The new Imperial Service Station on Grafton Street is practically completed, and some men have been released from the job.

The National Employment Office is receiving many inquiries as to when the work will start on the new Treatment Centre at Falconwood Institute. This project should absorb some of the construction workers now temporarily idle in the City. Other inquiries are being received as to the possibility of the new Federal Building being started this autumn. It is understood that demolition of the buildings on the selected site, may get underway sometime in September, but the office has been unable to receive any confirmation of this report.

Large Number Working

Although some people are idle in Charlottetown and throughout all of the area covered by the Office — this includes all of Kings and Queens Counties — a large number of people are working. The employment situation is not as good as it was a year ago, but unemployment is neither widespread nor of large proportions.

The number of people drawing Unemployment Insurance Benefits in the two counties, total population more than 60,000, is 430 as compared to 380 at the same time last year. Two hundred and three of the claimants reside in Charlottetown or within five or ten miles of the City; 227 claimants are residents of such places as Montague, Souris and Rustico, and the rural sections of Kings and Queens Counties.

At the present time, two representatives of the United States Air Force are visiting the Local Office for the purpose of recruiting help for United States Airbases in Newfoundland and Labrador. The bases are already built and established, and the men required are needed for maintenance work. Only skilled tradesmen are being selected; men with five or more years experience as qualified tradesmen. Girls are also being interviewed for office work, such as stenographers and clerk-typists.

Private Residences

A number of private residences are being built in the Charlottetown area, and this has been a considerable factor in keeping the unemployment figures at a fairly low level. Road construction and maintenance work being carried out by the Provincial Government throughout Kings and Queens Counties, is also helping to ease the work situation.

The Provincial Government has also several bridge crews working, and at Montague, a group of men are engaged in the reconstruction of the approaches to the new bridge which was finished last winter. At Souris the building of the new Griffin Fish Plant, is proceeding and giving employment to a number of people. The Dominion Government is carrying out a number of projects to wharves and breakwaters at several places along the coast-lines. Temporary work is presently being given to a number of men and women at the Exhibition grounds.

The overall employment picture is fair.

Unemployment is much more pronounced in some other towns and cities in the Maritimes, and the local National Employment Office has been advised that some of these have been declared labour surplus areas, by the Federal Minister of Labor. This means that the towns and cities mentioned have an over-abundance of unemployed people, and National Employment Offices in the Maritime area, are wanted to advise people seeking work, not to go to these cities and towns. Included in the list are the towns of New Glasgow, Sydney and Inverness in Nova Scotia; Minto and Fredericton in New Brunswick; and Cornerbrook, Grand Falls and St. Johns, in Newfoundland.

It is worth noting that Fredericton, listed as having labour surplus is only ten miles distant from the big military camp being constructed at Gagetown, N.E. It is definitely established, therefore, that it is useless for Islanders to seek work at this big military camp, or in any of the towns mentioned as designated labour surplus areas, by the Minister of Labor.

124th Anniversary S. Columba Church
