MIGRATORY BIRD CASES—
Yesterday morning at Sum-
merside two residents of Lower Mal-
peque appeared before Stipendi-
ary Magistrate Richard S. Hinton
charged under the Migratory
Bird Regulations with hunting
black ducks in close season. Both
pleaded guilty. Each were fined
\$25.00 and costs (\$8.00) or 30
days. The cases were the second
to the shooting up of the Big
Spring Pond, Lower Malpeque,
five days prior to the opening of
the duck season. The cases were
investigated and prosecuted by
the Provincial Fish and Game
Supervisor.
