Gold Mines Were Forced To Become Highly Efficient

"Adversity" has resulted in gold mines bringing their operations to the very highest pitch of economic efficiency," says V. C. Wansbrough, vice-president and managing director of the Canadian Metal Mining Association.

One result of this has been to make them particularly fine training grounds for students.

Addressing the Hurricane branch of the association at Bourlamaque, Que., recently, Mr. Wansbrough said seven companies of the Bourlamaque and Val d'Or area have given first-hand practical experience to more than 1,000 higher school and university students in the last five years.

The Canadian mining industry, he added, is creating more than \$2,000,000,000 a year in new wealth and is also pouring hundreds of millions of dollars a year into exploration, development of new properties, building of townships, power plants and railways, and

purchase of machinery, supplies and services.

However, the industry's most important function was the opening up of Northern Canada. Only a few years ago Val d'Or, for instance, was an outpost. Now it was a jumping off ground for fresh exploration hundreds of miles north.

Quebec's department of mines has issued a 34-page geological report—including maps and illustrations—of Northern Quebec.

The area—covering the basins of the rivers flowing into Ungava Bay, Hudson Strait, Hudson Bay and part of James Bay—has some 330,000 square miles, or slightly more than half the province's total area.

The study deals principally with iron-ore discoveries or prospects. Commenting that extensive tracts of the territory explorations will certainly reveal the existence of hitherto unsuspected mineral deposits."

King, general manager of Merrill Petroleum Ltd., Calgary, says in an article in the current issue of Canadian Oil-Gas World that Canada should impose a tariff on the import of foreign crude oil so as to make Canadian crude competitive in the Montreal refining area, now served by imports, chiefly from Venezuela.
