DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 26.

In reply to Mr. Curran, Hon. Mr. Tupper, who has recovered from his temporary illness, said that owing to misrepresentation the Montreal Harbor Police would be continued for the present year, and that the dues would be levied as usual.

Mr. Prior brought up the question of the illegal seizure of British vessels in Behring sea. He discussed the United States' claim of exhaustive jurisdiction, and contended that nothing could justify the recent seizures.

Mr. Davies agreed with Mr. Prior as to the importance of the matter, but argued that the delay in doing justice to the owners of seized Canadian vessels showed the necessity of Canada being represented at Washington. We must have the right to negotiate our own treaties.

Sir John said that Parliament had already passed on the question of establishing a commercial agency at Washington. The question was one affecting all maritime nations, who would, he felt certain, resist the iniquitous attempt of the United States to claim all Behring sea. England was pressing for a settlement of the Canadian claim which she had endorsed. The result of the United States continuing to insist upon its pretensions was something upon which he dared not now look, but he showed that Canada would insist upon her rights.

At 10 o'clock the House went into supply. At 11 o'clock the committee finished supply and the House proceeded to concurrence in the items in the estimates.

The House sat till a late hour.

NOTES.

The Senate to-night passed Mr. Weldon's extradition bill without amendment.

Manager Hickson, Assistant Manager Wainwright and Judge Foster, solicitor of the Grand Trunk, are here urging the Government to grant their company equal running powers over the Fredericton bridge and Harvey branch with the Canadian Pacific. Their request is backed up by many members.

The order in council of March 26th relating to lobster fishing has been cancelled and the following made in lieu thereof: First, on that part of the Atlantic coast from Cape Canso Western and following the coast line of the Bay of Fundy to the American boundary it shall be unlawful to fish for, catch, sell, buy, or have possession of, without a lawful excuse, any lobsters between the 1st of July and 31st December.

Second, in the remaining waters of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the waters of P. E. Island and Quebec. It shall be unlawful to fish for lobsters between the 15th July and December 31st. The section provides that it is unlawful to catch lobsters under nine and a half inches long, from the head to the tail, exclusive of the claws or feelers.

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The Gulf port steamship Miranichi arrived in port this morning. The River Line steamship Lake Nepigon arrived at Quebec at 2 o'clock this morning, and will be in port to-morrow. A dense fog prevailed on the river throughout the forenoon.

A public meeting is called for Saturday afternoon at Laval University to protest against the usurpation of the temporal power of the Pope.
