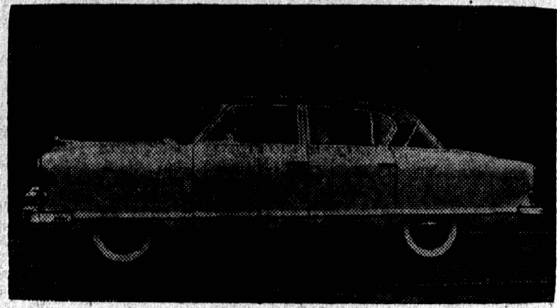

AAU Of The U.S. Plans Big Drive For Funds

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 — (AP) — The Amateur Athletic Union Monday launched a \$500,000 fund drive to enlarge the country's sports program with the battle cry: "We must beat Russia."

The drive starts Feb. 14 and will be raised by public subscription. "Russia subsidizes her athletes," said Jeremiah T. Mahoney, who heads a 70-man committee assigned to fatten AAU coffers. "She subsidizes her athletes with proletarian methods. She has millions training daily while working for the government."

"To meet this challenge we must make our country sports conscious, must reach out to get 5,000,000 yes, 10,000,000 more young men and women under athletic training."

Other AAU officials spoke of measures to improve U. S. standards in gymnastics, wrestling and other minor endeavors. Charles L. Ornstein, veteran AAU and Olympic official, said the American system of training gymnasts must be overhauled. "Russia's women especially dominated this event," Ornstein said. "That's because they were trained for it since childhood. They take ballet lessons to acquire grace and then they train constantly. Our women, to match them, will have to do the same."

It was through their success in gymnastics mostly that the Russians pressed the U. S. for the unofficial team championships of the Olympic Games at Helsinki last summer. After trailing most of the way, the U. S. rallied on the final week-end to gain an overall edge of 610 points to 553 1-2. Points are awarded for six places—10 for first, five for second, four for third, and so on.

Announcement of the drive was made by Douglas F. Roby of Detroit, national AAU president, at the luncheon meeting attended by AAU officials, newspaper and radio men.

Roby said the AAU has been losing about \$17,000 a year in trying to get along on proceeds from championship meets, club dues and individual fees. There are 2,264 member clubs.

Rocky Marciano Gets \$10,000 Ray Hockok Belt

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Jan. 28 — (AP) — Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano Monday received the \$10,000 Ray Hockok belt as "professional athlete of the year" in 1952 at the Rochester Press-Radio Club dinner.

Hockok presented the prize belt with its solid gold buckle and diamonds to the 28-year-old slugger from Brockton, Mass., to keep permanently.

Marciano, unbeaten in 43 fights with 38 knockouts, broke the grip of baseball in the pro competition. Phil Rizuto, New York Yankee shortstop, won the first award in 1950 and Allie Reynolds, Yankee pitcher, nipped Jersey Joe Walcott for the 1951 award.

Marciano polled 80 first-place votes from the country-wide panel of 146 sports writers and sportscasters. On the basis of 3-2-1 for a first, second or third-place mention, the Rock piled up 309 points.

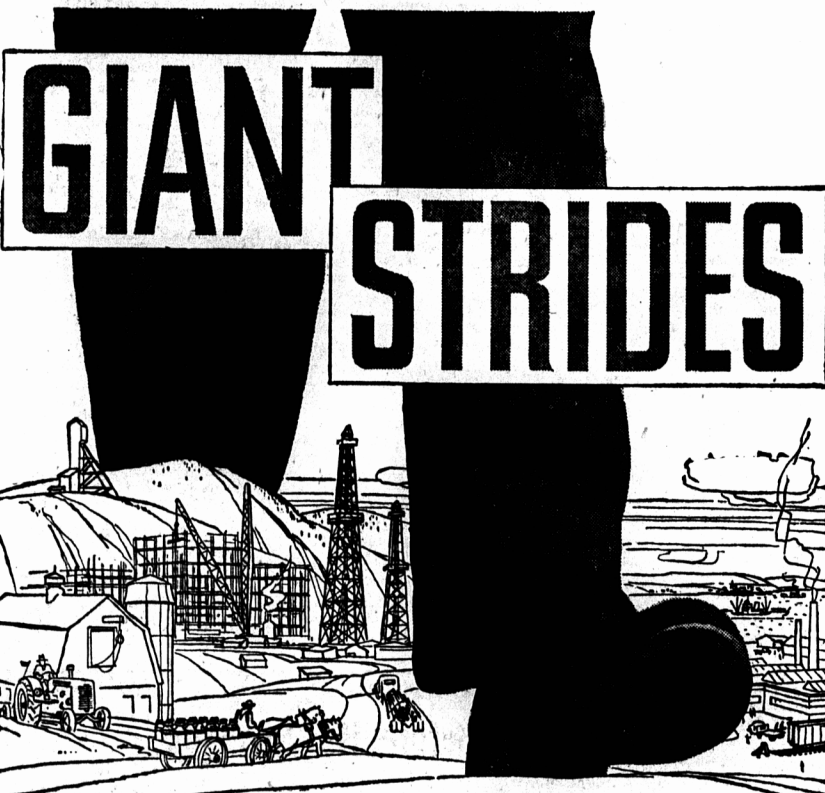

Quebec Senior League Statistics

MONTREAL, Jan. 28 — (CP) — Andre Corriveau, Valleyfield Braves ace, and Stan Smrke, Chicoutimi Saguenens marksman, are tied for top spot in the Quebec Senior Hockey League scoring race with 62 points apiece.

Corriveau has 26 goals and 36 assists while Smrke's total is made up of 26 goals and 37 assists.

One point behind the leaders is big Jean Beliveau of Quebec Aces. Beliveau now has 34 goals and is still the leading scorer in the loop and 27 assists for a 61-point total. Sherman White of the Chicoutimi Saguenens is the top helper in the league with 39 assists. He also has 21 goals for a 60-point total, two points behind the leaders and one back of Big Jean.

Ralph (Bucky) Buchanan, another Chicoutimi marksman, is next in line with a 22-35 for a 56-point total. Sherbrooke's Tod Campeau has 16 goals and 36 assists for 54 points followed by Jacques Locas, Sherbrooke sharpshooter who has 27 tallies to his credit along with 22 assists for 49 points.

Chicoutimi Saguenens are now atop the league standings with a pace-setting 59 points. Montreal Royals and Ottawa Senators follow with 55 and 46 points, respectively.

Sherbrooke Saints and Valleyfield Braves continue to battle for fourth place with 45 points apiece.
