 Friends far and near were shocked and saddened to learn of the death in the Prince County Hospital on October 25th of Harold Laird, Kensington, following a heart attack.

**Mr. Laird** was born in Kevin Grove, son of the late J. M. Laird and Jane (Walker) Laird and lived there until, due to ill-health, he retired to Kensington in the fall of 1956.

**A graduate** of the Truro Agricultural College, he returned to the Island to engage in farming with his father on the homestead. As J.M. Laird and Son, they showed their fine herd of beef cattle for a number of years at the Maritime Winter Fair, and other Exhibitions throughout the Maritimes, winning top honors in their field. **Foreign Help Move Coming**  
**WINNIPEG** (CP) - Premier Duff Roblin indicated Saturday he will ask the Manitoba legislature to approve a provincial "foreign aid" program to establish technical schools in underdeveloped Commonwealth countries.

**Mr. Roblin** said the plan, first of its nature to be considered by a Canadian province, developed from the Commonwealth parliamentary conference in Australia in November which he attended as representative of Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

**Increase Is Predicted In Construction Volume**

**OTTAWA** (CP)—J. Eric Harrington of Montreal, president of the Canadian Construction Association, Sunday forecast that the volume of construction in 1960 will increase modestly to about \$7,500,000,000.

**However,** he said in a year-end message that this figure will be realized only if the industry is freed from the effects of wars, prolonged work stoppages and inordinate increases in construction costs or comprehensive changes in planned building programs.

**"Most business and investment** surveys show growing optimism and the indications are that the construction industry is headed for another new record in 1960, both in terms of dollars and the physical amount of construction work put into place."

**Mr. Harrington** said that while the 1960 increase will be modest, it will mark the 15th consecutive year in which the volume of construction has increased over the previous year.

**Some 600,000 persons** would be employed in on-site operations and a similar number off-site. Competition would remain keen and the average rate of profit likely would continue to be low.

**If** sane bidding did not become more prevalent, about 30 per cent of contracting companies would operate at a loss.

**Mr. Harrington** said it appears that about 125,000 housing units will be started in Canada next year.

**Non-residential construction** should show a major increase in volume over 1959. This would be the result of a growing need for schools, universities, hospitals and commercial and industrial buildings.

**"If** the federal government implements a national highway policy, the outlook for an expanded road-building program would be very much brighter."

**WHEELCHAIR CAMPAIGN WIN**  
**Regarded As Stunning Upset**

**BOSTON** (AP) - He won one election when he was flat in bed, paralyzed by polio.

**His biggest political victory** came after he had campaigned from a wheelchair - and in the teeth of massive political support for his opponent.

**John F. Collins,** the experts agreed, hadn't a chance to be elected mayor of Boston. But he did it anyway, in what was called the most stunning political upset in Boston's history. He'll be inaugurated Jan. 4.

**Collins,** confined to his wheelchair after an attack of polio four years ago, doesn't consider it much of a handicap in guiding the city administration for the next four years.

**"I intend** to run the city with my head, not with my feet," he says.

**Behind his victory** is the story of devoted effort by his wife, who personally stumped for votes and garnered a corps of devoted women volunteers who went all out to campaign for the 40-year-old Collins.

**The majority** of voters who cast ballots last November were women. They helped sweep Collins into office by a 24,000-vote margin.

**Collins** first entered politics in 1946 when he won the first of two terms as Democratic state representative. Four years later he was elected to the state senate.

**In 1954** he aimed at the office of attorney-general, and lost.

**FOUGHT RETIREMENT**  
 But political retirement didn't suit him. He sought a seat on Boston's nine-man city council four months after his defeat.

**In September, 1955,** with the primary election only 10 days away, Collins and three of his four children were stricken with polio. The children—Patricia, 7; John Jr., 4; and Tommy, 3—recovered with no lasting effects, but doctors told Collins he never would leave his hospital bed. Paralysis had struck his throat, arms, abdomen and legs.

**It was** then that his wife, Mary, whom he had met and married after his first campaign, emerged as a pleasing and persistent voter-getter.

**Mrs. Collins** toured the city's 22 wards beseeching votes for her husband. A victory, doctors said, would give Collins the will to live. She stepped up her campaign tempo and in the November election her husband finished third in the nine-man field.

**Collins** still lay on a hospital bed when news of his victory reached him. He came home to his family on Christmas Eve but

**Collins** had little money. He described his resources as "nickels and dimes and an occasional dollar." He called his campaign committee his "kitchen cabinet."

**Four days** before the election internal revenue agents, by-passing state and local police, raided the headquarters of an East Boston gambling ring. The headquarters were in two buildings, only a block away from a police station. In front of each building posters were hung endorsing the candidacy of Collins' opponent for mayor.

**That night** on television Collins showed pictures of the posters along with a photo of Powers in a friendly pose with one of the 15 men arrested in the raids.

**Political** columnists say this was the turning point of the campaign. Collins got more than 113,000 votes, beating Powers by 24,000.

**Now,** in the mayor's role, he faces another tough battle—solving the city's serious financial problems.

**Collins' friends** are sure he will win again.

**Emergency Force Units Told They Are Setting Precedent**

**UNITED NATIONS** (AP) - Lt. Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Ottawa, commander of the UN Emergency Force, has told its members that its peace-keeping activities, they "are setting a precedent, which can develop and be of great consequence."

**His Christmas** message to the 5,350 men of UNEF, made public here Saturday, was sent from Burns' headquarters in Gaza, Egypt, to soldiers watching the Egypt-Israel border and the west shore of the Gulf of Aqaba. It read:

**"This** is UNEF's fourth Christmas. When this force was organized few thought that it would last so long. But you continue to carry out the task of your predecessors, helping to preserve peaceful conditions in this land, not far from the birthplace of Christ, whose natal day we celebrate.

**"Peace** on earth, good will to men" is the message traditionally linked with that first Christmas Day. In the centuries since, men have seldom enjoyed the peace they profess to desire.
