OBITUARY.—The news was received in Truro on Saturday last of the death in Boston of Mr. Thomas S. McCarvill. In September last Mr. McCarvill and family left Truro for the United States. Previous to his departure he worked for a number of years in the Guardian and Sun printing offices and was well known and respected by a large circle in Truro. He was attacked by grip some weeks ago and having partially recovered went back to work when he had a relapse and died on Saturday, Feb. 29th. Mr. McCarvill was a native of Prince Edward Island and a practical printer of many years experience. We tender our sincere sympathies to his bereaved family.—Truro Guardian.

Presbytery Meeting.

The Presbytery of P. E. I. met in St. James' Hall on Tuesday, Rev. Ewen Gillis, moderator pro tem. The first item of business was the consideration of the report of the Home Mission Committee.

A call from St. Paul's Church, Hawkebury, Ottawa, was placed in the hands of Rev. W. M. Tufts, and, having been accepted by him, it was reluctantly agreed to sever the pastoral relations which existed between him and the congregation of Bedeque. Mr. Tufts preaches his farewell sermon on the 13th inst. Mr. Dickie, Summerside, was appointed interim Moderator of Bedeque session, and was authorized to declare the pulpit vacant on the 20th inst. A call from the congregation of Murray Harbor South to Bro. Ewen Gillis, signed by 111 communicants and 148 adherents, was laid on the table, which being given to the congregation of West Cape to appear in their own interests at a meeting to be held in Charlottetown, on the 15th inst. In connection with Mr. McKenzie's resignation, a presbyterial visitation of St. Peter's congregation was appointed for the evening of Tuesday, the 15th inst, in Main Church, Rev. D. Sutherland to preach on that occasion, Messrs McMillan, Archibald, Carruthers, and Mehon were nominated a committee to visit Clyde River and West River congregation on Monday, the 14th inst., the public meeting to be held in the West River church at 7.30 p. m., and the sermon to be preached by Rev. W. P. Archibald. In accordance with the instructions of the Presbytery, the records of Valleyfield session were submitted. A committee reported on them and they were approved of and attested by the Moderator. Applications for grants from the Augmentation Fund were transmitted on behalf of Tignish and Montrose, West Cape, Tyne Valley, Covehead and Georgetown. A masterly and suggestive report was submitted by Mr. Archibald on behalf of the committee on Temperance. The assembly remits were handed over to the consideration of a committee composed of Messrs. Carruthers, Sutherland and Maion. Presbytery adjourned to meet in Zion church, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, the 15th inst., at 11 a. m.
