UNEMPLOYED PROTEST FOOD

Police Precautions Taken In Winnipeg.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, June 24 - The north-end headquarters of several hundred single unemployed men were closely watched by police tonight for signs of further demonstrations by the jobless against alleged poor food served in relief dining halls.

With the men were 38 others released from police custody after a night in the cells following the stopping and boarding of three street cars. The men pleaded not guilty in court today to charges of disorderly conduct, and were remanded for trial until June 30.

The demonstrators, protesting against what they said was the poor quality food served in the relief kitchens, pushed past the operators without paying fares. Police removed them from the cars without trouble, arresting the 38.

Following a night of bedlam in the police station, as the arrested men shouted and sang throughout the night, several hundred of their supporters massed before police headquarters today in protest against their arrest. The demonstration ended quietly when the prisoners were released.

Drought Damage To Crops Mounts

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, June 24 - A June drought which burned into middle west crop prospects with an intensity approaching that of 1934 added additional losses to its mounting millions of dollars today.

From the eastern slopes of the Rockies to the foothills of the Alleghenies the moisture deficiency continued. High temperatures and drying winds in parts of the Dakotas added their damage and Governor Elmer Holt of Montana reported conditions were "growing worse hourly" in Southwestern Montana.

"Only the fact that it has been cooler generally has given this month a better showing than June 1934" said "Nat Murray, widely known Chicago crop observer.

Japanese Threaten To Call Warships

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TIENTSIN, June 27 - Indian warships hinted tonight that warships would be the answer to Chinese marine attacks on suspected smugglers.

A spokesman at the Japanese consulate indicated a squadron of destroyers was being sent from Port Arthur to patrol the Gulf of Chihai, North China's vast harbor.

The Japanese hinted, too, they might demand complete withdrawal of Chinese customs patrol vessels from Northern waters unless "the situation is ameliorated."
