

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

LITERARY AND SCIENTIFIC.—The Literary and Scientific Society will not hold their opening meeting this evening as intended. The notice will appear later.

HEAVY RAIN.—Between ten o'clock on Tuesday evening and six o'clock last evening two and a quarter inches of rain fell. The average velocity of the wind was six to ten miles. The weather to-day is pleasant though not clear.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The Executive Committee of the City Teachers' Institute will meet in Mr. Stewart's Office at 4 p. m. tomorrow. This being their first meeting it is important that all members of the committee should be present.

THE GREAT CANDIDATES.—At the Liberal Convention held at Georgetown on Tuesday, Edwin McFarlane, of Annapolis, and Captain James Burke, of Georgetown, were nominated to contest the Fifth District of King's at the Provincial election. The former has been chosen to represent the property holders, and the latter the franchise voters.

CHURCH RE-OPENING.—The Roman Catholic Church at Freetown will be re-opened for service on Sunday next, the repairs and alterations to the building having been completed. His Lordship Bishop Macdonald will be present, and an appropriate sermon will be preached by Rev. B. B. Macdonald, of Lunenburg. Service begins at 10 a. m. There will be a silver collection.

FRUITS OF THE SEASON.—A young lad named Louis Leonard Penwarden, showed the Pioneer, on Monday last, some ripe wild strawberries which he picked up on the previous day in a field of stumps owned by Mr. Mason McNeill, of North Carolina, and Mr. Sidney S. Weatherill, of Georgetown, sends the Guardian a lilac flower and a horse chestnut blossom in full bloom, taken from trees at Burnt Point on the 23rd inst.

RISK MEETING.—At the annual meeting of the Hillsborough Risk Company last evening the following directors were elected for the ensuing year: President, Horace Hazard; Vice President, F. L. Hazard; Secretary-Treasurer, D. C. McLeod; other directors A. A. Bartlett, and W. A. Weeks, Jr. The secretary-treasurer submitted his report. No dividend will be received by shareholders, and the directors were instructed to make some changes in order if possible to make the concern a paying one.

ORDERED TO MOVE OUT.—Yesterday afternoon John Shea appeared before H. V. Palmer and Samuel McKee, J. P.'s, on complaint of James Bradley. Bradley charges Shea with refusing to leave his premises on Great George Street after the period for which he had rented the house expired and he had been given notice to quit. Shea was ordered to vacate the premises by Monday next, after which date a writ of possession will be issued against him.

NO CERTIFICATE.—Michael Davitt has been refused a certificate in bankruptcy. Mr. Davitt was forced to appear to the bankruptcy court in consequence of expiring in contesting the north division of Meath, from which constituency he was returned in the general election. He was unseated on petition, it being charged that his election was due clerical intimidation. In defending the action heavy expenses were incurred. Mr. Davitt was subsequently elected to represent the northeast division of Cork.

VERY SAD INDEED.—A woman on her way to Port Mulgrave, N. S., yesterday with an 11-month-old child, found when she reached this city, that her child was too ill to be taken any further. She decided to send it to the hospital here and continue her journey. She was compelled to go home because of the expense of remaining here, which she was not in a position to stand. Her parting with her child was a very hard trial, particularly as it is very probable the infant will not recover.—St. John Telegraph.

SURFING AT SUMMERSIDE.—The Summerside Pioneer says: The Fred E. Cox, Capt. McConnell, came into this port on Monday and will be loaded by Mr. A. M. Wright for the West Indies. She will take about 12,000 bushels of oats, and Mr. Wright expects to get her off the latter part of this week. The Hattie Louise, Capt. King, also arrived here on Tuesday with sugar and molasses on board. After discharging she will take on board her usual cargo of oats and horses. The Sir Hilbert, a new three-masted schooner, named after the new knight, the Minister of Marine, came in here on Tuesday and will also be loaded with oats by Mr. Wright for the West India market. She belongs to River John, N. S.

BASKET SOCIAL AT SOURIS.—A few of the ladies of the Presbyterian congregation of Souris decided on having a basket social in aid of the Sunday School and organ funds of the church, which was carried out most successfully on the evening of the 18th, in the store lately occupied by Knight & Morrow. After a short impromptu entertainment, in which the leading talent of Souris took part and acquitted themselves well, A. E. Clarke, the popular station-master, was called to the stand and acted as auctioneer, in which capacity he is without a peer. THE OSPEY ARRIVES.—By cable to C. H. Schurman, we learn that the schooner "Ospey," Capt. Whittle, has arrived in Trinidad West Indies, after a very rough passage. The Ospey lost part of her deckload.

ENGINEERS' INSPECTION.—By a telegram received this morning, we learn that the Charlottetown Engineers will be inspected by Captain Huskisson, of the Royal Military College, Kingston, on Saturday, Nov. 4th.

POSTPONED.—The charges of violating the law respecting the fishing and canning of lobsters during the close season to have been heard before A. Lord, Esq., Fishery Officer, yesterday afternoon, have been adjourned until Wednesday next on account of the absence of material witnesses.

STEAMERS MOVEMENTS.—The Farinet leaves for Halifax via Summerside this afternoon, with a good general cargo. The Colan leaves for St. John's via Sydney this afternoon with a cargo of produce, horses and sheep. The Polino leaves for Pictou and St. John's this afternoon with a good general cargo.

BULLETIN A TREE.—Mr. William Campbell, of Graham's Road, writes to the Farmer as follows: A few days ago I was getting a few hardwood logs for the purpose of having them sawed into planks to repair my horse stable. In one log (about 13 or 14 inches through) near the heart, the saw ran into a bullet that must have been there for quite a number of years as there was at least six or seven inches of solid wood all around it. There was a slight rot around the ball, the point of which was flattened out but the other was hollow. It appears strange to have found it there, I think.

MORE LOBSTERS SEIZED.—A Halifax despatch of the 24th, to the St. John Sun, reads as follows: "Forty cases of canned lobsters were seized yesterday in the steamer Fastnet from P. E. Island. The trouble with the lobsters is they are supposed to have been caught and canned in the prohibited season, which is from July 15th to December 21st." We are informed by Mr. W. W. Clarke, agent for the steamer Fastnet at this port, that the lobsters were not seized on the steamer as stated, but on Noble's wharf, after they had been landed from the steamer for shipment to Boston. He says further that the lobsters were sent here from Wallace to be shipped in lots as ordered, that they have been in his warehouse since the 27th of July and were caught in season.

THE TURF.—Referring to the well-known trotting horse Stranger, the Halifax Recorder says: Stranger was sired by Sir John Dean, bred on P. E. Island, and some years ago was sold by W. B. Bowness of that place, for \$80. He was handled by I. T. Winans, and in the three minute race at Amherst in 1891, won in straight heats in 2:38. He was then purchased by a well-known North End grocer, who afterwards, having no use for a trotter, offered to sell him for \$250, but not being able to obtain a purchaser, disposed of him by lottery, at one dollar a ticket, and Mr. McGehey was the lucky man.

Baldwin, who takes part in the match race at Souris on Saturday, and Parnell, who starts in the 45 class, went to Souris this morning in charge of Mr. P. S. Brown. All that is needed now is fine weather.

Next morning they were late about arising, and the landlady, upon going to their room, found a great odor of escaping gas. The door was promptly broken open, and there were the three men lying in the bed in an unconscious condition and choking at the month. A physician was called in with all possible despatch, and after a good deal of trouble he succeeded in bringing them around. When Gill recovered to a certain extent he became violently insane and had to be put in a straight jacket for about fifteen minutes. It is supposed that O'Donnell was the last to retire, thoughtlessly blew out the gas instead of turning it off.

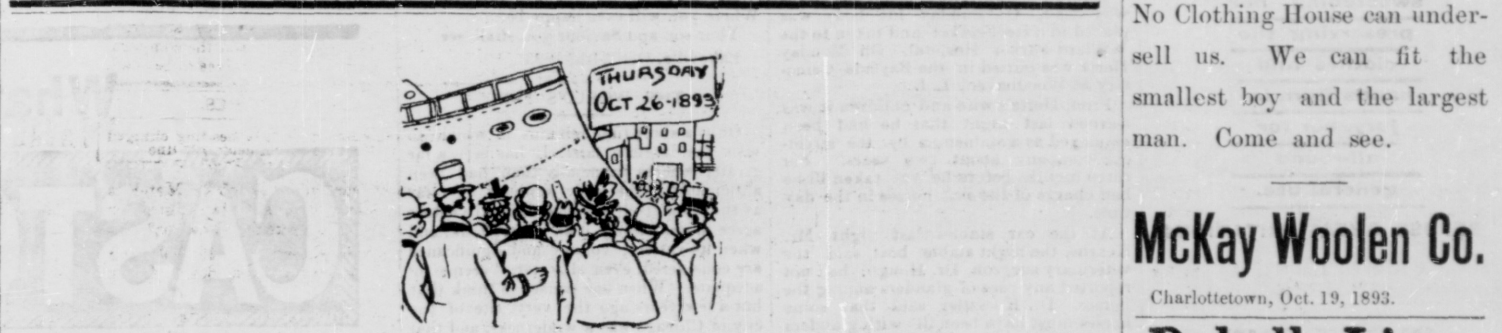
