Conference Opens Here Today On Adult Education

Using as their theme "Looking Ahead in the Maritimes," many of the Atlantic Provinces leading educational, industrial, scientific, political and economic officials meet today at Saint Dunstan's University for the opening of the Atlantic Regional Conference of the Canadian Association for Adult Education.

The conference opens this morning and concludes at noon on Wednesday. The official opening takes place this afternoon in the S.D.U. Alumni-Gymnasium at two o'clock. During a buffet luncheon at noon today Dr. J. R. Kidd, Director of the Canadian Association for Adult Education will speak on Adult Education in Canada.

This will be followed one hour later by the official opening presided over by conference chairman, Mr. H. B. Chandler of Charlottetown.

An address of welcome will be delivered by Rt. Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, Rector of Saint Dunstan's University. Dr. F. W. Walsh, Vice-President, Canadian Association for Adult Education will bring greetings from the Canadian parent body. Conference committees will be named and ten reports on Adult Education Activities will be given.

At 3:30 p.m. Dr. G. G. Kerr, Director of Extension and Professor of History at Mount Allison University, will preside over a panel discussion on "Looking Ahead in the Atlantic Provinces".

Other members of the panel will include Messrs. R. W. Ganong, St. Stephen, N.B., President of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council; D. J. Gannon, President of the Nova Scotia Federation of Labor (T.C.L.); W. Y. Smith, Professor of Economics and Political Science, U.N.B.; and J. L. Dewar, Secretary of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture.

The evening session, presided over by Premier A. W. Matheson, will be highlighted by two addresses. These will be given by Mr. John H. Dickey, M. P. (Halifax), Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa; and Dr. Eugene Forsey, Research Director, Canadian Congress of Labour.

Discusses

"Much has been done in recent years, and much is being attempted by leaders of the fishing industry to improve the quality of fish marketed, and in this you have played an important part. Fresh fillets, and dressed fish in particular, are being given extra attention from the time caught until it is eaten, and top scientists and technicians are concentrating on the problem. While there has been a general improvement, handling, especially during distribution, leaves much to be desired. A chart showing how quality deteriorates was prepared last year by the Province of Quebec, and shows that fish held at water ice temperatures from the time it is caught deteriorates so rapidly that in eight days it has lost all its fresh flavour. We have given a very considerable amount of thought to the transportation of all food products, and are satisfied that in carload movement any perishable commodity can be protected to almost any destination on the continent. This is a bulk movement. It also seemed to us that the small producer, whose business did not warrant carload shipments, and whose business did not provide for an economical load for a railway car, was being overlooked. With that thought in mind, our Research Branch developed a refrigerated container which, for want of a better name, we have since called a "Canex" container, the word "Canex" being an abbreviation of "Canadian National Express, which department is presently responsible for the distribution. This container is designed to transport 160 net pounds of fresh fillets, plant chilled to 29 degrees, and hold them at that temperature in ambient summer temperatures for up to 100 hours. AVAILABLE FOR RENT CALL: "It has been the practice, mostly in the United States, although there has been a world interest, to provide a slightly different container and to sell or rent it to the trade. This is not the case with the "Canex" container, which is patented in our own name and is wholly owned by this railway. It is available on call wherever it is needed and may be transported within Canada to any railway point, giving the assurance that fish removed from it at the end of 100 hours will be equally as good as when packed. As a demonstration of this, we have experimented with the handling of quality fish, plant chilled and transported at 29 degrees, on four of our name trains, and out of 210 people answering a questionnaire, 189, or 90%, said that there was an improvement in the taste of fish served. While fish represents only a small fraction of the two million meals which we annually serve

on our dining cars, in effect about 5 per cent, there has been a noticeable increase in fish orders. It is too early to assess just what this means, but it has been definitely established that fish sales have increased on the trains by 30 to 50 per cent, and the answer is not far to seek. Fish packed in water ice, it is well known, as the ice melts leaches out its juices and flavours. No water moisture of any kind reaches "Canex"-transported fish, nor does it dry out. Fish so transported, even at long periods and to farther distances than the 100 hours, has been removed from the container in as sparkling condition as when it came from the water. Use of this "Canex" container proves that top quality east coast fish can be transported farther inland and find wider Canadian markets than have been developed heretofore. As lately there appears to be an increasing interest in filleted fresh fish, and the per capita Canadian consumption of all fish is so small (just over 13 pounds, as compared with 30 pounds in the United Kingdom and 83 in Japan), we hope that by supplying our homes with fresher, more flavourful fish, this consumption may be increased, and in the aggregate more employment may be provided for our fishermen, and we, in turn, share in your added prosperity."

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Meeting At Souris Of P.E.I. Fisheries Federation

Mr. Gordon O'Brien, Ottawa, secretary-manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada was the guest speaker at the regular quarter-annual meeting of the P. E. I. Fisheries Federation held at Souris Saturday.

Mr. O'Brien in his remarks dealt with the close association with the supplemented by local member associations across Canada were represented in the fisheries council. He emphasized the close liaison work between the council at Ottawa and the Federal Department of Fisheries, and he felt that this close association worked to the mutual benefit of the two interested parties. Mr. O'Brien went on to explain the new sales promotion program respecting fishery products, and pointed out to the members the considerable competition which had arisen during the past several years with the consequent drop in fish consumption by the buying public of Canada. He was of the opinion that the fishery industry must meet this competition by a concentrated and continued program of publicity in order to bring home to potential customers the advantage of using fish products. The program he stated, should include publicity re fresh frozen fish, canned products, salt fish, etc., and should appear in trade magazines, popular home magazines, newspaper, radio and television. This program would be carried on through a nation-wide basis, and the publicity undertaken by the local associations. He was assured that this was the only proper means of meeting present competition, and felt that it was the most important way to safeguard the future of the industry and the livelihood of the fisherman, packer and processor.

Mr. O'Brien continued his remarks by stating that the council and the trade had been subjected to some criticism for not making effective use of the mechanical refrigeration box constructed by the C. N. R. for the specific use of small lot shipments. Mr. O'Brien said that although the canex box was a good idea and did keep fresh frozen fish in good condition, nonetheless the trade was hesitant to use it since it would involve a considerable change in the set-up of packing plants, and the present cost of distribution would not warrant such a considerable change over in order to use the canex box. He further pointed out that the canex box did not fit in with the present distribution system, and that it was probably ahead of its time, but could conceivably find its proper place in the scheme of distribution in the future.
