

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, June 15.—On the supplementary vote in the House of Commons to-day granting \$40,000 to the royal world's fair commission, Mr. Gorst, financial secretary to the treasury, replied that the vote was increased to \$60,000 to give free space and render the exhibits worthy of the United Kingdom. The vote was agreed to.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 15.—Official reports as to harvest prospects show the general outlook much worse than in the early summer of 1891. Locusts destroyed the crops in the Caucasus. Much cannot be hoped for in Southern Russia where crops were ravaged by worms and by field marmot. At the beginning of the last famine a stock of grain was in store, while now there is none.

TORONTO, June 15.—Mr. Blake has not yet decided whether or not he will accept the offer of Irish Nationalists of a seat in the Imperial Parliament, but will probably make his answer known this week or as soon as the date of election is fixed. He still refuses to talk on the subject. The offer of the seat was made by Justin McCarthy, John Dillon, Michael Davitt, T. M. Healy and William O'Brien. Patrick Boyle, editor of the Irish Canadian, believes the followers of Parnell and McCann would unite under Blake, but it must be admitted the general feeling is that he would be no more of a success as a leader of men at Westminster than at Ottawa. As an imperialist, Blake would be distasteful to Irish-Americans.

MONTREAL, June 15.—A meeting of Count Mercier's creditors took place to-day, when the official list of liabilities amounting to \$61,900, was presented with the following statement of assets:

MONTREAL, June 15.—George Hogue, the eminent general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, fails entirely to agree with Cartwright and Laurier that the farmers are going to the dogs. At the annual meeting to-day Hogue read letters from his local managers throughout the country, showing that out of 29 branches, where farmers deposits are received, receipts have increased in 27 and decreased in the other two very small. Referring to \$21,000,000 increase in savings bank deposits, Hogue said he had little doubt that a large proportion of this increase came from farmers.

School Houses Wrecked

NEAR MONTREAL, AND TWENTY-FIVE CHILDREN KILLED AND WOUNDED.

A St. Rose, Que., despatch of the 15th says: The counties of Laval and Terrebonne, and, in fact, the entire valley of the Lower Ottawa, was the theatre of a terrible devastation yesterday afternoon. In this village a dozen buildings were thrown overboard, killing Julie Joly, aged six, Wilfrid Dumit, 7, and Stanislas Dubois, 8, wounding 20 or more, and amongst these dangerously injured being the teacher, Mlle. Lecaese. Damage to property in this parish is estimated at \$63,000. A schoolhouse was also overthrown in St. Therese, two of the children being crushed to death beneath the debris and a dozen more badly wounded. In various two houses were destroyed and \$40,000 is the amount of damage done to the parish. The damage to property at Leclerc, St. John's and other points is said to be considerable, yet happily no loss of life is reported from these places. Montreal escaped entirely.

A Hard Profession.

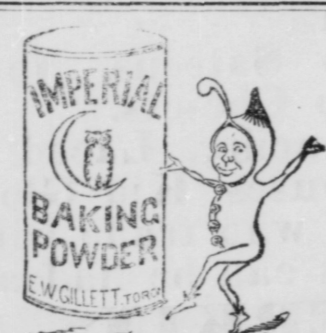

PARTIES using the Telephones would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following rules:—

1st. Speak with the mouth about four inches from the transmitter.

2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too loud and distinctly.

3rd. Place the telephone so as to cover the ear, just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds. Do not rest too hard on the ear.

It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter. If you speak too far, it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a needless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying to all within range of your voice.
