Dulles Would Release Prisoners On Schedule

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said Tuesday all anti-Communist Chinese and Korean prisoners should be set free Jan. 22, whether or not a Korean peace conference is held.

Dulles made his declaration at a press conference, apparently rejecting Indian Prime Minister Nehru's view that the future of anti-Communist prisoners would have to be re-examined if plans for a formal peace parley collapse.

Nehru said Sunday he believes the neutral nations repatriation commission, whose chairman is an Indian, has no authority to release prisoners who refuse to return to Communism.

Challenging this view, Dulles said without mentioning Nehru that "armistice provisions are clear" on the point.

The future of anti-Communist prisoners has become an increasingly important problem in view of the failure of UN and Red negotiators to agree on an acceptable basis for a peace conference.

In talking with reporters, Dulles made no prediction as to whether a peace parley would be held on schedule. But he emphasized in a prepared statement that the Communists agreed to the United Nations' view that all prisoners should be turned loose without restrictions 120 days after the "explanations" begin.

Huge Undersea Earthquake Rocks Tokyo

TOKYO, (Reuters)—A huge undersea earthquake rocked the Japanese capital twice Thursday and sent thousands of panic-stricken families fleeing from their homes.

Only one person was reported killed—by a falling high-tension wire. But meteorological experts warned that the city had barely escaped repetition of the 1923 earthquake disaster which caused 140,000 deaths in Tokyo and Yokohama.

Thursday's tremors were strong enough to have caused damage at least equal to the 1923 catastrophe if they had been centred on the mainland, the experts said. However, most of the earthquake's force was dissipated between the coastline and the quake centre 120 miles southwest of here in deep ocean off the Boso peninsula.

Another ocean earthquake Wednesday shook the island kingdom of Tonga, one of the spots which Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh will visit during their current tour.
