British Columbia Minerals.

A SHORT INTERVIEW WITH MR. J. R. BELL, THE SCOTCH CHEMIST AND MINING EXPERT.

A representative of the Vancouver Telegram had an interview with Mr. J. R. Bell, the Glasgow chemist, analyst and mineralogist, a few days ago. He has thoroughly canvassed the qualities of the various mines in the province, and in the spring will visit the most promising claims in the various districts. Mr. Bell said: "I think that the prospectors who have good claims make a great mistake in trying to work them with out capital. They do not put forward efforts to interest the English capitalists, and the general opinion in that country is that these mines have been all worked out. Indeed, the idea of British Columbian mineral deposits is very hazy at the most, and to secure foreign capital one would not only have to court the fullest enquiry, but put some energy in their invitations. The small companies organized and the speculative prospectors do not at all give the scope to this industry that it would seem to deserve. The mines in Alaska are paying at a yield of one ounce of gold to the ton, but they are in the hands of a wealthy company. In some of the inaccessible regions where gold has been discovered it would require at least a yield of two ounces per ton to make it paying one. I intend to make a careful survey and examination of the principal mines in the spring."

Mr. Bell will remain in Vancouver until the opening of navigation up the country.

Horse Notes.

A pony (12 hands 2 inches) was recently matched in England to trot 15 miles in an hour. The little fellow won with 18 seconds to spare, and without making one break in the whole journey.

A horse's face contains as many characteristics as does that of a human being. A Roman nose in a horse indicates strong individuality, often accompanied by great intelligence. A dish-faced horse is rarely found. We have seen a few exceptions to this rule but they only prove it. A fine muzzle usually denotes a high nervous organization, while a coarse and large muzzle, with small non-expansive nostrils and pendulous lower lip, means stupidity. A sensitive and trumpet shaped nostril means courage and intelligence, even when it sometimes does it also means heaves. A broad and full forehead and length from eye to ear are the sp-significant features of a horse's face.

Charles Marvin, the noted trainer, had quite a varied experience in several other occupations before he engaged in the business of training trotters. He was first a miner, then a government teamster, then a cavalryman, next a livery stable keeper, in which business he first began to handle trotters. The great Smuggler falling into his hands, he campaigned him successfully for a year or two, or until the horse broke down. Not long after this he was given a position at Palo Alto on trial as trainer, and giving satisfaction he soon became superintendent, which position he has filled up to the present time. He has always been noted for his honesty, and always driving to win. And his great reputation is, in fact, due to this quality. Few dishonest drivers ever become famous.

Monument to Father Boudreau

A short time ago a handsome monument was erected in Miscouche cemetery, in memory of the late lamented Father Boudreau. This monument is of polished blue marble, is 8 feet 9 inches in height, and of graceful proportions. It is finished with Gothic arches, surmounted by a plain cross. The four arches are ornamented with a rose, lily, chalice with corn and grapes, and a symbolical inscription, respectively. On the memorial tablet are the following inscriptions, in Latin, French and English:

D. Nazarii Caroli Boudreau,
Qui morum suavitate,
Omnibus christianis prae se dedit
Die V Januarii an 1889
Aet XXXVII. Presbyterat XIII.
Hoc positum est.

"En Memoire
du
Rev. Nazaire Charles Antoine Boudreau,
Ne le 9 Sept., 1852
Ordonne presre le 25 M., 1876.
D-cede le 5 Janv. 1889.

It a passe en fassant le bien.
"The parishioners of St. John the Baptist's, Miscouche, erected this monument in grateful remembrance of
Rev. N. C. A. Boudreau,
who for ten years was their esteemed and zealous pastor. We loved him in life and let us not forget him in death."

This beautiful monument, which was erected by the Miscouche parishioners at a cost of about a hundred dollars, to their late pastor, is the handiwork of our esteemed woodman and skilled marble worker, Mr. Joseph Cox—Agriculturist.

Where the Boodle Went.

INTERESTING LIST OF POLITICAL RECEIVERS OF STOLEN GOODS.

Le Courier, of Quebec, explains in a few words how the people's money was squandered by the Mercier government. Here it is:—"Mr. Pacad has placed his credit in the Union Bank \$211,000 in the space of five months. Mr. Charles Langelier built a house that cost \$25,000. Jean Chrysostome Langelier made \$15,000 out of four-cent pamphlets, Joseph Beausoleil, partner of Mr. Mercier, drew from the treasury \$31,000. "Petit Baptiste (L'anglais) quietly juggled to the profit of the Liberal party \$60,000, \$25,000 and \$5,000."

Mr. Mercier, having in a newspaper interview in Montreal attempted to mix up the name of the provincial secretary with Whelan's political subscription John P. Whelan has written to Hon. L. P. Pelletier, giving the ex-premier the lie direct. "Mr. Mercier," he says, "is, as usual, incapable of telling the truth." He states that the \$1,500 note he gave to Belleau & Co. was given at the request of M. Garneau, who at the St. Louis hotel asked for this sum for the election of October 14, 1886. On Nov 10th Mr. Garneau sent Belleau to collect it. Whelan adds that Mr. Pelletier never had anything to do with it, one way or another.

Le Eleveur is telling its readers that Mr. Martineau, the independent liberal candidate, has resigned. It is afraid that his candidature will ruin Mr. Gage's chances, and if a handful of lies will induce him to resign, Le Eleveur will not spare them. Mr. Martineau is still a candidate.

One of the many foreigners who fed at the government crib while Mercier was in power was Mr. Temple, a Belgian, who was appointed director of night schools. He was author of the "Methode Nationale de Dessin," which he wished to have introduced in the public schools, but the council of public instruction refused to approve the work. Nevertheless, it was forced on them, for Charles Langelier ordered 8,000 copies at \$1.20 each, and Temple drew \$10,000 from the government. It would be interesting to know what toll he had to pay.

Mr. Bornatchez, the Liberal candidate in Montmorency, stands by Mr. Mercier in spite of all that has been proven against him. He has many and substantial reasons for this course. He has drawn from the government for himself and family \$17,000 during the past four years.

The Liberals of Quebec East are anxious to hear what their member in the House of Commons really thinks about the recent boodling exposures, but Mr. Mr. Laurier speaks not. He is trying to ride two horses at the same time.

Grit Impudence.

A contemporary makes the following sensible comment. The impudence of the average grit is beyond all comprehension. The courts have not yet concluded the work of unseating the followers of Mr. Laurier who were elected last March. No less than twenty-six, or more than one-fourth of the entire opposition contingent at Ottawa, have been unseated for corruption, and one has been disqualified—that is, debarred from running an election or even voting at an election for the period of seven years. It has already been shown that Mercier stole the money of the people of Quebec to the extent of nearly two hundred thousand dollars, for the purpose of securing the return of Mr. Laurier's supporters, and yet Cartwright and Preston and others of the party high and low go about the country calling upon the people to vote out the corruptists, and after every Conservative victory the cry goes up from the grit newspapers that the government party are buying up the constituencies by wholesale. Take the records of the courts since the election law was made strict, and more than two-thirds of all the members unseated have been grits. While seven-eighths of those convicted of personal corruption belong to the same party. This is not more assertion, but a cold fact. We do not say that the Conservative party is pure, but we do say that with greater opportunities and temptations

from being in power the greater part of the time since Confederation, the Conservatives compare more than favorably with their opponents in this respect. The grit professions of purity and their declamations against the corruption of the Conservatives would be amusing, if they were not so disgusting.
