

Ellerslie Legion Announces Three Scholarships Available

ELLERSLIE — A list of scholars to be awarded this year to students completing work in grades eight and ten has been released by the Ellerslie Branch, Royal Canadian Legion. The three scholarships, having a total value of \$75, will be presented to the successful applicants in the school year just ended on July 1 if proof of marks is included in the application and the student plans to further his or her education or training. The scholarships are as follows: \$100 to the child of a Legion member making the highest marks in grade 10; \$50 to any student making the highest marks in grade 10; \$25 to the child of a Legion member making the highest marks in grade eight. This scholarship is made available by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Ellerslie branch and members' dues must have been paid before April 1. All applications must be received by Harry Ellis, Northam, the chairman of the scholarship committee, not later than Aug. 15.

Canadian Tax Incentives Designed To Aid Monopolies

WHITEHORSE, Yukon (CP) — The royal commission on taxation was told Monday that Canadian tax incentives for the mining industry are designed to assist giant United States mining operations and deliberately curtail the development of free competition. The statement came from the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (I.M.M.S.W.) which called for a tax revision that would tighten taxes around big corporations and loosen them around employees, particularly in Canada's northland. Existing tax laws, said the union, are "framed in such a way as to encourage the fastest possible exploitation of any conceivable natural resources in their primary and raw form and to discourage the development of secondary processing plants." Tax incentives for the mining industry are built around the "risk" allowance for primary production. Since the majority of investment came from major U.S. corporations, these incentives encouraged the firms to mine natural resources in Canada and take them back to the U.S. for secondary processing. "The industry has become dominated by foreign U.S. capital to the point that our precious assets of natural mineral resources are being run by Canadians, from Canada a large amount, shipped off to the U.S. for processing and manufacturing and the tax system of the country is framed to encourage this." The union pointed to the three-year income tax exemption given to new mining development, as well as to study the possibility of implementing a capital gains tax on the industry and eliminating some of the depletion allowances now granted. And in cases where "foreign and monopoly domination" of the country's natural resources held back development, the government should step in to establish a smelting and refining plant or provide development incentives to help Canadian companies do it. If companies are justified in claiming a three-year tax holiday because of the risk question,

Shawinigan Tenders Open

MONTREAL (CP) — Jean Claude Lessard, chairman of Hydro-Quebec, said Tuesday three tenders are being considered for the purchase of 6,867,213 common shares of Shawinigan Industries Limited. He did not name the tenders. Hydro-Quebec acquired the stock last spring when it took over Shawinigan Water and Power Company, along with 10 other Quebec power companies. Shawinigan Industries Ltd. was formed as a holding company to dispose of Shawinigan Water and Power's non-power assets. Former Shawinigan Water and Power shareholders exercised rights granted by the expropriation deal and bought 1,203,686 shares of the new company. Tenders were called by Hydro-Quebec for the remaining 6,966,713 shares.
