"Son of Paleface," the newest and without the slightest doubt, the best of Bob Hope's impinging array of sensationally successful comedies, is by all means a movie-goer's wildest dream come true! Meanwhile, Hope locates his father's treasure chest and discovers it to be empty, a fact he tries to keep concealed in light of a horde of his father's debtors constantly harassing him for settlement of Paleface Senior's unpaid bills. Thinking that Hope is really in the money, Miss Russell lays plans to get the comedian under away his fortune. At this point, Roy Rogers and his companion, Trigger, get into the act and the result is a kind of wild bedlam that promises to break down the house with each subsequent performance.

ligate and recommend on the payment of war claims generally. These are expected to number in the thousands and it will likely take years to settle all of them. They cover a wide area, from property losses in the 1939 sinking of the liner Athenia to years of hospital bills for ailments arising from imprisonment.

It is quite possible, for instance, that veterans of the Dieppe raid of 1942 will come forward to claim special compensation on the grounds that they were maltreated so that their ability to earn on liberation was impaired by their shackling by the Nazis. Some have already put in claims.

Widows of Hong Kong veterans are liable to get varying amounts. For instance, a woman whose husband was a prisoner, say, 30 days before he died would be entitled to \$30 but pension payments would be taken into account by officials in deciding what she should get. The force sent to Hong Kong consisted mainly of two infantry battalions, the Winnipeg Grenadiers and the Quebec Royal Rifles.
