Magistrates Court At Georgetown

A number of cases were disposed of at the Magistrate's Court at Georgetown, held in the Court House on Thursday, July 12, 1951, at 10.00 A.M., before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, J. W. MacDonald, K.C. A resident of Cardigan charged under Section 285 (6) of the Criminal Code of Canada, with "Driving in a manner dangerous to the public", had his case adjourned for one week. The same party charged with "Obstructing a peace officer in the lawful execution of his duty," under Section 188 (4) of the Criminal Code, also had the hearing of his case adjourned for one week.

A resident of Primrose charged with having liquor in his possession which was not purchased at a vendor's, contrary to Section 29 (2) of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25.00 and costs or one month in King's County Jail, in default.

A Cardigan resident was fined \$5.00 and costs or 7 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a motor vehicle without an operator's license. A resident of Fort Augustus pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle, on the highway, the weight of the vehicle being over 5000 lbs., at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour. He was fined \$15 and costs and in default of payment to serve 10 days in jail. This charge was under Section 36 (2A) of the Highway Traffic Act.

A resident of Brudenell also charged under Section 36 (2A) of the Highway Traffic Act, was fined, on pleading guilty, \$15 and costs or in default to serve 10 days in jail.

Two residents of Murray River each charged under Section 36 (2) of the P. E. I. Temperance Act, with being intoxicated in a public place, both pleaded guilty and were each fined \$20.00 and costs or in default to serve 30 days in jail.

A resident of Glen William was charged under Section 20 (1) of the P. E. I. Temperance Act, with having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence. He pleaded "not guilty", and following the hearing of the evidence he was found guilty and fined \$20 and costs or in default to serve 30 days in jail. Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., Crown Prosecutor for King's County, represented the Crown.

Two King's County lobster packers, charged under the lobster Fisheries Control Regulations with having in their possession undersized lobsters, pleaded guilty and were fined \$50 and costs. Court adjourned to Thursday, July 19th at 9.00 A.M.
