and clothing as well as bolts and wheels  
axles. It buys almost every conceivable  
thing, and it is necessarily in close touch with  
markets at home and abroad. It has built  
up or been instrumental in building up hun-  
dreds of new industries in the country and it  
is the chief support of many of them, and its  
relations with these markets and these in-  
dustries justifies my belief that unrestricted  
reciprocity with the United States, and a  
protection tariff against the rest of the world,  
would make New York the chief  
tributary point for the Dominion instead of  
Montreal and Toronto, would localize the  
business of the ports of Montreal and Quebec,  
and destroy all hope of the future of the  
ports of Halifax and St. John, would ruin  
three-fourths of our manufacturers, would  
fill our streets with the unemployed, would  
make Eastern Canada the dumping ground  
for the grain and flour of the Western States  
to the injury of our own Northwest, and  
would make Canada generally the slaughter-  
market for the manufacturers of the United  
States, all of which would be bad for the  
Canadian Pacific Railway as well as for the  
country at large. This is my excuse for saying  
so much.

I am not speaking for the Canadian Pacific  
Railway Company, nor as a liberal or a con-  
servative; but only as an individual man  
concerned in the business interests of the  
country and full of anxiety lest a great com-  
mercial, if not a national, mistake should be  
made.

**King's County.**  
LARGE MEETING AT  
SOURIS EAST.

MACDONALD AND MACLEAN  
HANDSOMELY RECEIVED.

The meeting at the Agricultural Hall,  
Souris East, on Friday, 20th inst., was  
attended by about seven hundred electors of  
the surrounding settlements. Every part  
of the large hall was packed with intelligent  
people.  
Mr. McIntyre was the first speaker, after  
the meeting was duly opened by the chair-  
man, Alex. Robertson, Esq. For half an  
hour he occupied the platform, but his  
speech evoked no enthusiasm.  
When Mr. John McLean came forward  
to speak, everyone could see that he was  
the "favorite" of the East Point district.  
Mr. McLean delivered a splendid address,  
showing the difference, from a financial  
standpoint, between the policy of the Lib-  
eral-Conservative party and unrestricted  
reciprocity, the platform the grists have  
adopted. He showed that the adoption of  
the grit policy meant direct taxation, and  
quoted facts and figures in support of his  
statements. He said that there was also  
another great question before the people of  
Prince Edward Island at this election, viz.,  
the tunnel, and showed that Sir John A.  
Macdonald was more likely to spend money  
for its construction than the grit party who  
have declared against the expenditure of  
public money for railways and works of  
that kind.  
Mr. McLean's clear reasoning was highly  
appreciated by the audience, and repeated  
rounds of applause were given him.  
Mr. Robertson then came forward and  
made a subtle appeal to the farmers at the  
meeting who were in poor circumstances,  
for support for Dr. McIntyre and himself,  
who, he said, if elected, would open wide  
the door to the United States.  
The independent and prosperous farmers  
of the East Point district will vote solidly  
for McLean and McDermott; and although  
some of the grit "healers" made an attempt  
to get up applause, it sounded very feeble  
in the large building where the meeting  
was held.  
Mr. A. C. Macdonald was next introduced  
by the chairman, and he delivered a telling  
speech, quoting from Erasmus Wiman (the  
father of unrestricted reciprocity) to prove  
that its ultimate object was annexation.  
Mr. Macdonald's address made a very  
favorable impression on the meeting.  
Thomas Kichham, Esq., M. L. C. followed,  
and tried to show that the people of  
Prince Edward Island paid duty both on  
what they exported and what they imported.  
It was "heads I win; tails you lose"  
with him.  
Senator Prowse then addressed the meet-  
ing, and from an independent standpoint  
showed the necessity of the people of the  
Island supporting the Government of Sir  
John. As one of the first to advocate the  
building of the tunnel across the Straits of  
Northumberland, he earnestly hoped that  
the people would do nothing to jeopardize  
its speedy commencement.  
Mr. A. Currie, of Souris, then talked for  
half an hour on free trade and protection.  
Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. P. P., was invited  
to speak, and coming forward expressed  
the gratification he felt at being present for  
the first time at a meeting in Souris. He  
took up the question of Unrestricted Rec-  
iprocity from a farmer's standpoint, and  
after thoroughly sifting it, asked Dr.  
Robertson and McIntyre to produce  
any official evidence they had that the  
United States would grant it.  
He quoted from Mr. Blaine to  
show that the people of Canada  
cannot be British subjects and enjoy the  
benefits of the American market at the  
same time. He also quoted L. H. Davies  
as showing that Unrestricted Reciprocity  
was absolutely impracticable. Mr. Shaw,  
during his speech, especially when he was  
depicting Dr. Robertson and McIntyre as  
struggling with Mr. Blaine for Unrestricted  
Reciprocity, was greeted with the wildest  
applause, and his telling hits caused Dr.
