LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The Pilotage Matter.

SIR,—The garrulous old Harbor Master
of Annandale (I beg his pardon—of Grand
River), thinking, no doubt, that his effu-
sions, if published in the Grit papers,
would only be read by a few of his own
political stripe, has had a second letter
written, to which he has attached his signa-
ture. The letter in question is quite char-
acteristic of its real author. It opens out
by telling us that a former letter was not
written in order to bring "myself," the
Harbor Master, into public notice. Who
cares whether it was or not? What we
want to know is this: Were the buoys at
Grand River in their proper position when
the George Harold went ashore? I posi-
tively assert that they were not; and the
Harbor Master in his letter shies clear of
the only point at issue in which the public
are specially interested, viz., the position
of the buoys at the time of the disaster.
The buoys, I repeat, were not where they
should have been, and I charge the Harbor
Master with neglect of duty in not having
them in their proper place; and I trust
that the Agent of Marine may make a note
of this, and cause an investigation to be
made forthwith.

The concluding remarks of Ronald S.
McDonald are somewhat disappointing; for
we are told that he is not going to take
any further notice of anonymous scribbles,
myself, I suppose, among the rest. He
admits, however, that I may be an author-
ity on frog ponds, quagmires, &c. It is a
good thing to be an authority on some-
thing. I never heard that either Ronald,
or his letter writing chum, was an authority
on anything except on thistles and juniper
ram-picks. I could tell him something
about marshes that would not redound very
much to his credit. Ronald is a confirmed
Grit, and so is also another loudmouthed
officer at Annandale, who is never tired of
abusing the Government. Ronald and his
political chums try to make it appear that
parties in Georgetown are bent upon ruin-
ing the reputation of Grand River as a
place of shipping. Nothing could be fur-
ther from the truth; and no one but an
unprincipled slanderer would attempt to
cause ill-feeling between the people of
Georgetown and the people of Annandale.
If a pilot belonging to the former happens
to blunder in entering the port of Grand
River, the people of Georgetown are not
responsible. Nor are they responsible for
Ronald S. McDonald, who allowed the
buoys to be out of place.

I know the good qualities of Grand
River harbor as well, and better than
Ronald S., and am determined that neither
his neglect, nor that of his Grit associate,
the buoy contractor, shall bring our noble
harbor into disrepute.

Imperial Federation.

A Nova Scotian branch of the Imperial
Federation League has been formed, the
general committee of which is composed of
Sir Adams G. Archibald, His Grace Arch-
bishop O'Brien, Mayor Mackintosh, Hon.
A. G. Jones, Ald. Stephen, Messrs. M. B.
Daly, M. P. B. W. Chipman, J. S. Mac-
lean, W. C. Silver, Adam Burns, John
Donell, Col. Lane and Col. Black. It is
reported that much enthusiasm was mani-
fested at the first meeting. A resolution,
moved by Sir Adams G. Archibald,
seconded by Mayor Mackintosh,
and carried unanimously, sets forth
"That in order to secure the permanent
unity of the empire some sort of federation
is essential.

"That for the purpose of influencing
public opinion in Nova Scotia, by showing
the importance and advantages of maintain-
ing British connection by the adoption of
such a system of organization, a society be
formed to advocate and support the prin-
ciples of federation.

"That this society be now formed, to be
called the Nova Scotian branch of the Im-
perial Federation League."
In the course of his remarks on the occa-
sion, Sir Adams G. Archibald said: "Some
of the more elderly among those present
would recollect the magnificent speech on
the subject delivered by Joseph Howe
some years ago. He had never heard one
to approach it in force, and to give those
present who had not heard or read the
speech an idea of it, he quoted an eloquent
passage in which Howe predicted the
realization of imperial federation. Howe
was a practical man, who looked into
the future and perceived the inevi-
table. Thirty years have passed since
his speech was delivered and many of the
men of that day have passed away. Then
the colonies were small in population, but
since then they have increased by many
millions. Of later years the question of
Federation of the empire had been agitating
the people of England more and more, but
though it was a subject of much discussion
no man of prominence had undertaken to
bring it prominently forward until Mr.
Forster had taken hold of it. Sir Adams
briefly alluded to Mr. Forster's interest and
efforts in the movement, and the excellent
paper on Federation of the empire by Sir
George Boyle, one eminently fitted to dis-
cuss the question, who was so well acquaint-
ed with the feeling and sentiments of the
people of the colonies because of his long
residence among them in various parts of
the world.
