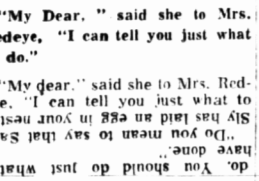

G. N. P. Is High But Below The Liberal Forecast

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's economy showed some signs of leveling off in the first three months of 1957 after a prolonged period of continuing rises, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday.
An indicator was the gross national product — value of all goods and services produced — which stood at an annual rate of \$30,910,000,000 for the three months. While sharply higher than the annual rate of \$28,726,000,000 in the first quarter of 1956, the 1957 rate was just slightly below the record \$30,966,000,000 in the October-December period of last year.
Canada, for the year as a whole, had a gross national product of \$29,866,000,000 for 1956 and the Liberal government earlier this year forecast an increase to \$31,250,000,000 for 1957.
LITTLE INDUSTRIAL CHANGE
In the January - March period, industrial production — excluding farms—showed virtually no change in output from that of the October-December period.
There will be no accurate estimate of farm production until later this year. The first - quarter report includes only an arbitrary figure based on the assumption that a normal crop will be produced compared with a large crop turned out last year.
While industrial production showed little over-all gain, consumer earnings and expenditures continued to increase to new peaks.
Labor income rose to a record annual rate of \$15,076,000,000, compared with \$14,822,000,000 in the last quarter of 1956 and \$13,638,000,000 in the first quarter.
Consumer spending increased to a peak annual rate of \$19,492,000,000 from \$19,198,000,000 last quarter and \$17,936,000,000 in the first quarter of 1956.

my fifth diamond. Declarer finesed. Crawford's king won and a heart was returned.
South took my nine with the ace and led the king of clubs. I won with the ace, cashed both my hearts and also the diamond.
Declarer, holding K - J - 10 of spades and queen of clubs, had to discard on the diamond. He could not very well spare the queen of clubs, which would have established Crawford's jack, so he discarded the ten of spades. Crawford thereupon parted with the jack of clubs.
By the time Crawford's last three cards were A-Q-9 of spades, when I led my singleton spade, declarer's K-J were trapped and Crawford took the last three tricks.
When the score was finally tallied it was found declarer had taken one trick, the ace of hearts. He was down six - 100 points—again. I never did find out about Gold-schmidt.

Two Premiers Will Join Discussion On The B. W. I.

SACKVILLE, N.B. — In preparation for Mount Allison 1957 Summer Institute on "Canada and the West Indies Federation" that is to meet here August 8 to 10, at least four Canadians including Premier Hugh John Flemming of New Brunswick will visit the West Indies. They will attend a conference being organized at Mount Allison's suggestion by the University College of the West Indies from August 2-4 and will fly back in time to participate in the institute here. Included in the group, in addition to Premier Flemming, will be Alexander Brady, head of the department of practical economics, University of Toronto; Leonard Kitz, mayor of Halifax, and Nelson Mann, executive director of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.
Another visitor to the West Indies at that time who will participate in the institute here is J. E. E. P. Registrar and dean of residence Trinity College, Toronto, who will be conducting a tour of the West Indies organized by the Canadian Association for Adult Education. It is expected that several others making this tour will also be at Mount Allison.
Coming from the West Indies as leaders of discussions here will be Hon. Grantley Adams, who has been premier of the Barbados since 1954, and Hugh Woodings, a business leader in Trinidad.
WILL ATTEND
Representatives of governments expected to attend the Institute here include J. Thompson, deputy high commissioner for the United Kingdom in Canada, Ottawa, and Alastair Scott, the director of the United Kingdom information office in Montreal; Charles J. Burgess, acting trade commissioner of the British West Indies, Montreal; A. F. W. Plumtree, associate deputy minister of finance, Ottawa; C. M. Isbister, assistant minister of trade and commerce, Ottawa; George Paterson, director, agriculture and fisheries branch, department of trade and commerce, Ottawa, and representatives of the departments of external affairs and fisheries, Ottawa.
Also planning to come are R. F. Johnson, secretary, Canadian Atlantic Salt Fish Exporters Association, Halifax; President Watson Kirkconnell of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S.; J. A. Sauge, general manager, Canadian Steamship Lines, Limited, Montreal; and Michael Wardell, publisher, the Atlantic Advocate and the Gleaner, Fredericton, N.B.
Mount Allison Summer Institute is a public affairs programme of Mount Allison University and is open to all interested in public affairs. "Participate in the discussions or just listen" says the announcement. This year the institute is being held for the third time. Two years ago the theme was "Canada and the Commonwealth" and last year "The Arts in Canada." Dr. D. G. Kerr, head of the Mount Allison history department, is chairman of the institute. Committee and Prof. Ian Campbell, the executive director.

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Village Loses Field Battery

ANEROLD, Sask. (CP) — A unique phase of Canadian military history has ended here with the demobilization of Anerold's 60th armored field battery.
The unit, formed in 1927, gave this small unit of 300 men, located about 150 miles southwest of Regina the distinction of being the only village in Canada with an army battery of its own.
The decision to disband followed an announcement that the Anerold armories, headquarters of the 60th since 1948, would be closed down after being condemned by army engineers as unfit for use.
The battery, made up largely of men from this community and district, went overseas during the Second World War as part of the 17th field regiment, 5th armored division.
One of its members, Sgt. E. Knight, received the DCM for gallantry. During the time the unit was active four officers were qualified as lieutenants and one lieutenant was promoted to captain. At its close, the battery comprised three officers and 21 other ranks.
The men of the 60th claimed another distinction, dating back to 1931.
In that year one 60th obtained permission to hold a camp at nearby Lac Pelletier. By hauling their guns behind ancient trucks through the dust-bowl to this new location, the battery set a precedent as the first mechanized unit in Canada.
KNOWN TO MANY

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LESSONS FOR W.I.

Are there lessons for the West Indies in Canadian federal experience? That is one of the questions which is expected will be discussed. Others: Will the West Indies follow Canada's example in her follow-up Canada with the Commonwealth and United States? What about other external relations? With Nato? With the United Nations? Will the West Indies serve as a link between Canada and South America? Is there a link between Canada and Africa? Is there immigration from the West Indies and Canada? What steps would encourage greater trade between the West Indies and Canada? Currency and tariff adjustments? West Indian development with capital assistance from Canada? What ethnic lessons can the multi-racial West Indies and the bi-cultural Canada learn from each other? Have we cultural contributions to make to each other?
The plan is for the Institute to open here on the afternoon of Thursday, August 8, with a symposium on "Problems of Federation," the first speaker to be Prof. Brad Fleming by Premier Adams and Flemming.
"Canada and the West Indies in World Politics" is the proposed subject for the forum on the Thursday evening.
On Friday morning the theme will be "The West Indies Economy" and the speakers being Mr. Wooding and Mr. Plumtree. The theme on Friday afternoon will be "Canadian-West Indies Trade," the speakers being Mr. Isbister, Mr. Johnson and Mr. Sauge.
"Canada's economic interest in the West Indies" will be the forum topic that evening.
On the Saturday morning "Patterns of Culture" will be the topic. In the afternoon Mount Allison Summer Convocation will be held, followed by the Summer Institute dinner followed by a forum on "The Arts and Humanities in Canada and the West Indies."
