MONDAY

New schedules, regulations and rates of charges for electric power and energy supplied by the Maritime Electric Company, Ltd. throughout Prince Edward Island have been ordered by the Provincial Board of Public Utilities and become effective as from August 1st with the exception of the general service rate for summer accommodations. The latter service rate will remain unchanged until the end of 1951.

Reasons for the general rates revision affecting both urban and rural communities are given in the Commission's judgment, which is published in full below.

Released to the press on Saturday, the judgment is dated July 30 last and is signed by Commissioners C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman, L. B. MacMillan, secretary, and W. R. Brennan, member.

The 1951 Field Day at New London Illustration Station, proved to be an auspicious occasion in the fact that in addition to the guest speaker, Mr. Shuh of Nova Scotia, and the presence of Dr. Fisher in his capacity of Director of the new set-up of Veterinary Services, four very brilliant and distinguished agriculturists from India and Pakistan were present. Each spoke briefly before the record audience gathered under the big tent. First to be introduced by Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent, Experimental Station Charlottetown, was Mr. M. Sial Minister of Agriculture and Education, Province of Khyalpur, Pakistan, and holder of several degrees, including that of M.Sc. from Rutgers University, New Jersey, U. S. A. Mr. Sial spoke briefly, but in complimentary terms, placing P. E. Island's Experimental Station second to none seen thus far since coming to North America.

The election of Mr. D. R. MacDonald, Halifax, as president of the Maritime Christian Missionary Society featured the business session of that group at the Maritime Convention of the Churches of Christ which closed last night.

TUESDAY

Mr. Jackson Dodds, C.B.E., Deputy Chief Scout for Canada, has arrived in the Province accompanied by his daughter, Miss Jean Dodds, to spend a holiday at Dalway.

Mr. Dodds has recently returned from the International Boy Scouts Conference at Salzburg, Austria, where representatives from some 40 countries met to exchange views and further the spirit of good will.

A discussion over the decision of Mayor B. Earle MacDonald to remain in office and proceedings instituted in Supreme Court as a result broke out at the monthly meeting of the City Council held yesterday afternoon.

The question was raised by Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone, who asked the opinion of the Recorder as to what the City should do. Recorder K. M. Martin replied that the City was not being sued, the proceedings were against the Councillors. Mr. Johnstone replied that if he were being sued he wished to know something about it. The Recorder suggested that the Council was not the place to discuss the matter. It should be done in caucus.

Improved workmanship is noticeable this year. In the work being shown at the Women's Institute exhibits at the Provincial Exhibition, Miss Mary Robins, Supervisor of Women's Institutes stated that there is a marked improvement in all classes, and Mrs. George Clark and Miss Jean MacLean, judges of the knitted and crocheting classes praised the work in those classes, mentioning in particular several knitted and crocheted bedspreads of unusually fine quality.

Judging in the knitting and crocheting classes, which took place yesterday afternoon, was done by Mrs. George Clark and Miss Jean MacLean, Charlottetown. Mrs. Harold Landry of Montague and Mrs. Allison MacLean of Summerside, were judging the sewing and needlework classes, and Mrs. Ralph Balderson of Winsloe and Miss Dolor Richards of Summerside are judging the rugs.

In the handicraft shop there are further examples of the skill with which Island women are wont to work. The articles are too numerous to mention all, but among the most interesting are two terramio exhibits, the work of well known Island potters. Mrs. Mark Malone has on display some of her work, and has set up her potter's wheel in the shop in order to demonstrate her methods during the coming week. Mrs. Mosse also has pottery on display, which is made without the use of a wheel and is finished with the conventional higher glaze.

The shop is crowded with other interesting pieces of work, including some of the fine woodwork of Mr. E. V. Bell of Charlottetown, paintings by Island artists, and needlecraft and leather work.

The Provincial Exhibition and Old Home Week were officially opened last night by Premier J. Walter Jones when he briefly addressed a large opening night crowd which had gathered to watch the start of the harness horse racing.

The Premier paid tribute to the management of the Driving Park for their initiative in giving the public what he described as "one of the three best shows of its kind in Canada". The Premier jokingly admitted that the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto might be better, and saying that he had never seen it, he thought from reports that the Calgary Stampede might be as good as the show here.

He said if it grew any bigger the crowds could not be handled because of transportation difficulties and told the crowd that the Province was not advertising its tourist attraction to any extent because of inability to transport more people than at present.

Sub grading was started on the West Island Hill at Montague yesterday in preparation to paving. Several truck loads of gravel have been placed on the hill as the first grade, and yesterday afternoon a government surveyor was determining high and low spots for further filling. It is understood that light pavement, consisting of chips and tar, will go on the hill and may be started in a very short time.

WEDNESDAY

A large group of the 'Old Sweats' of the First World War gathered together yesterday for a reunion when the members of the 8th Canadian Siege Battery, C.E.F., held a get-together at Dalway and later sat down to dinner at Sandy's.

The former gunners came from many parts of Canada and the United States to be with each other this year and honor the memory of those who did not return, or have passed along since then.

One of the best dairy cattle shows to be seen here for some time got underway yesterday with the exhibition of the Province's fine Holsteins and Guernseys that lasted from before nine in the morning until 7.30 last night.

Lewis Bros. of York were the top winners in the Holstein competition as they won a total of 12 firsts, eight seconds, seven thirds, three fourths and other placings.

But top honors in the female competition went to the boys' father, Colby Lewis of Freetown and the top prizes in the male classes went to Premier J. Walter Jones with his Bunbury Farm Herd.

The veteran showman, Guy Rodd of Brackley was once again the top man among the Guernsey breeders as he won a total of 15 firsts out of a possible 22.

Mrs. Rodd won all the male and female championships as well as the grand and junior reserve male honors. In addition, he had five second placings, a third and two fourths.

Owen Younker of Clyde River had four firsts in the Guernsey competitions. He also had the senior reserve female animal.

Another fatality occurred in the city yesterday morning when a two-year-old girl was almost instantly killed when she was struck by a car on Chestnut Street near her home. The child, Nesta Loughran, who lives at the home of her grandmother, Mrs. Henry Loughran, was apparently standing in front of a parked car on Chestnut Street. She suddenly ran out in the street directly in the path of an oncoming car driven by Mr. William Long, Charlottetown.

The regular monthly meeting of the Kensington Town Council was held on Monday evening with Mayor Waldron Darrach presiding and with a full attendance of the councillors.

Bills amounting to \$698.88 were passed and ordered paid. A bylaw respecting vacant lot owners was introduced by Councillor Kennedy and after three readings was passed. This law will give the council authority to levy a town tax, the rate at their own discretion on lots which previously have been assessed at one dollar per year only.

The judging of this week's top-notch livestock show at the Provincial Exhibition wound up yesterday morning with the judging of the draft horses.

Honors were well split up with firsts being won by Lorne Ferguson, Craapud, R.R., Oswald Newson and Son, Clyde River, Robert Chappell and Son, York; S. C. Stewart and Son, Dunstonsfarge; and Cecil J. Stewart, New Wiltshire.

Mr. Ferguson of Craapud had three firsts in the male classes. S. C. Stewart and Sons won two prizes for foals and the Newson's won the honors in the get of sire class. Other high placings were won by Whitfield Yeo, North River, Jordan Walton, DeSable and John Watts, New Wiltshire.

Rev. Father J. P. E. O'Hanley, Professor of Philosophy at St. Dunstan's University, has been appointed to the Chaplain Branch of the Royal Canadian Air Force, and was attested at the recruiting center in Summerside this week.

Father O'Hanley is at present en route to the air base at Trenton, Ontario where he will receive an indoctrination course, prior to assuming regular chaplain duties. He holds the rank of Honorary Flight Lieutenant.

A keenly contested Sherborn show that saw the honors well split up among the breeders highlighted the opening of the beef cattle show at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday.

Biggest winner was Atho Roberts of Southport who had six first prizes and a like number of seconds. John and Mary DuPasquier of St. Peter's Bay and Lyle Boswall of Marshfield, were other big winners.

The Maritime Grand Champion at Amherst last fall in the female classes, Teekaydee 4D, won the female grand championship here yesterday and also the senior female honors. The animal is owned by Atho Roberts.

Male honors were won by Lyle Boswall of Marshfield. The Boswall-owned Fairrange Ransom won the grand and senior male championships and Tullock Ransom Charmer, also owned by Mr. Boswall, was the junior male champion and the reserve grand.

Canard Count, owned by Francis Gleeson and Roy Mutch of Earnsccliffe was the senior male reserve. Long Valley Falcon, owned by Mrs. Blake Wood, Southport, was the junior reserve in the male classes.

THURSDAY

Yesterday Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gardner of Central Lot 16 celebrated their 72nd wedding anniversary. This is an event which must surely be unique in the annals of the Province. Mr. Gardner is 94 and his wife is 89 and they live by themselves in the home they established shortly after their marriage.

Last year Mrs. Gardner had a serious illness but she made a remarkable recovery and this year they are able to observe their anniversary together once more. Sunday evening a quiet family dinner was held in their honor at the home of their granddaughter, Mrs. Chalmers Hutchinson of Lot 16.

A rumour that the F. W. Woolworth Co. Ltd. will open a store in Summerside which has been current for some weeks has been confirmed. They will locate in a portion of the Smallman building formerly occupied by the hardware department and renovation of this part of the premises has been under way for about two weeks. The hardware department has been moved to the basement. The inside arches connecting the Cooperative Super Market, Woolworth's and Smallman's will be retained and will be open during business hours. Further rumours are to the effect that a forty foot extension to this portion of the building are planned by Woolworth's as soon as building restrictions are lifted. — S

At the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening, Mayor Henry Rodd presided and Councillors present and Mayor Rodd presiding and with a full attendance of the councillors.

The bonds to be issued will bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent instead of 3 1/2 per cent as previously decided and Councillor J.L. Gorrill explained that this was so they would be more easily sold as the Federal Government is now paying 3 1/2 on new bond issues.

A motion was also passed authorizing the issue of \$300,000 worth of overdraft instead of \$200,000 to cover the cost of capital expenditures for this year. During the reading of the minutes it was divulged that a special meeting had been held on July 26th at which the paving of Maple Avenue had been authorized. This motion was moved by Councillor J.L. Driscoll and seconded by Councillor H. B. Schurman.

At the August meeting of the Alberton Town Council held in the Court House last evening with Mayor Profit presiding and Councillors Currie, Corbett, Matthews and Profit in attendance, a letter was read in which it was stated that the company is negotiating with Mr. W. A. Gordon re purchasing the electric light system in Alberton if mutual agreement can be reached. The letter stated that no improvement of the overhead wire system can be expected until the heavy tree growths along the town streets. Unless this can be done with full co-operation of the council and citizens, the company claims it will be futile for them to take over the system at all. They do not wish to spoil trees unnecessarily but state that citizens wish to sacrifice trees in return for more adequate power supply.

In response to this letter it was moved, seconded and carried that full co-operation be given to Maritime Electric Company in regard to the removal of trees or branches that would in any way interfere with transmission of light or power within the town.

FRIDAY

One of the best horse shows to be staged at the Provincial Exhibition in recent years was two thirds completed yesterday and was viewed by larger crowds than has been the case in former shows.

Cecil Stewart of Hampshire won the top honors in the Clydesdales yesterday. Mr. Stewart won the grand male championship with Civic Chief Jr. and also the grand and senior female championships.

Top honors in the Percherons went to Lorne Ferguson, Craapud and Donald MacFayden. Mr. MacFayden won the grand and senior female championships and Mr. Ferguson the grand and senior male honors.

The standard bred classes, H. B. Willis with Argot Pointer won the male championship in the standard bred classes. The champion mare was owned by Roy Bevan of Charlottetown.

One of the best dairy cattle shows ever held here was concluded yesterday with the judging of the Jerseys and Ayrshires in an exhibition that was marked with top-notch competition and sportsmanship in the battles for honors.

Two veteran show families, A. MacRae and Sons of Central Royalty and Keith Boswell and Sons of Victoria vied for the Ayrshire supremacy although they were given strong opposition from the other breeders, particularly Col. F. I. Andrew and Almon Wood of Little York.

The North River Jerseys of Edson B. Mutch were again the big guns in the Jerseys classes. Big Mr. Mutch did not have things all his own way this year as George MacMillan, Cornwall, and Clark Bros., New Wiltshire cut in for a large share of prizes.

The sheep judging was completed yesterday morning with S. C. Stewart and Son, Dunstonsfarge winning the honors in the Shropshire Downs; Almon Boswall taking top spot in the North Country Cheviots and the Cheviots; and Lyle Boswall of Marshfield heading the exhibitors in the Oxford Downs.

S. C. Stewart and Son won all the prizes in the Shropshire Downs as they were unopposed. Almon Boswall of Marshfield made a clean sweep in the North Country and the Cheviot classes.

In the Oxford Downs, Lyle Boswall won practically all the prizes, the only exceptions being one first, a second and a fourth prize by John R. Thompson of Marshfield.

—DWELLING DESTROYED— Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the residence of Mr. Albert Elliot at Knutsford on Tuesday morning and Mr. and Mrs. Elliot barely escaped with their lives. The flames were first noticed by Mr. and Mrs. Elliot as they were coming down stairs about six o'clock and they and their family of five children were just able to escape before the flames completely engulfed the residence. As they lived some distance from any neighbors the fire had completely destroyed the house before anyone could get to the assistance and in a short time the building was beyond saving. Barns and sheds nearby were saved but the estimated loss would be in the vicinity of about \$4000.00.

—On Tuesday and Wednesday the parishioners of St. Anthony's, Charlottetown, celebrated the 150th Anniversary of the arrival of the pioneers of their parish. Tuesday evening at 6.30 in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Cascumpeque there was a large gathering of St. Anthony's parishioners. Rev. Father J. P. E. O'Hanley conducted appropriate religious ceremonies assisted by Rev. Father Pius Finnin now attached to the Bathurst, N. B. diocese. The weather was very inclement and there were no outside speeches.

The Hereford Kings from North River, Miller and Fulton Sanderson again swept all the honors in the Hereford show at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday as they displayed some of the finest Hereford cattle to be found in Eastern Canada.

Top honors were taken by the Miller Sanderson herd as they won the grand and senior male and female championships and placed firsts out of the sixteen classes.

Fulton Sanderson won the Junior female championship with Lady Paladome 2nd. He also took the grand and senior male reserve honors with Duo Hier, a mature sire.
