LAST SAN RIVER.

The mortal part of the late Augustus Hermans was committed to the earth yesterday afternoon, the interment being in the Roman Catholic cemetery. There was a large attendance at the funeral. The pallbearers were: John Macoschorn, P. Blake, Frank McKenna, James Macdonald, Peter Halloran and M. P. Hogan.

PALACE COURT.

This forenoon John Wilson was fined \$4 or 20 days for being drunk and disorderly, and John Martin, for a similar offence, was fined \$1 or 5 days. Martin was also ordered to pay \$1.50 for glass broken by him in the store of R. E. Bruce. Patrick Clarke, truckman, was fined \$1 and costs for assaulting Frank Gillis.

ATTORNEY THE BICYCLISTS.

The Toronto board of police commissioners have decided to put into force the regulations of the City Council relating to bicycle "scorching." Special constables attired in civilian clothes and mounted on wheels, will be placed at strategic points, with instructions to overhaul all wheelmen whose speed exceeds the limit laid down in the by-law.

SWALLOWED A HAT PIN.

At Windsor Mills, Que., one day last week, a two-month-old kitten belonging to the Rev. C. W. Finch, swallowed a hat pin five inches long. The kitten was playing with the hat and soon after the pin was missed and kitty took sick. An effort was made to doctor the kitten, but it continued getting worse for four days when it was shot to relieve it of pain, and the pin was found.

ANOTHER ROBBERY.

Some time last night the shop of Mr. Walter P. Doull, on Kent Street, was broken into and a new bicycle, owned by Mr. J. B. Dawson, was stolen therefrom. A pane of glass in the rear window was removed, and through the opening thus made the thief displaced the fastening. Basing the window he went inside, and opening the door took out the bicycle and decamped. The police are investigating.

RESCUED FROM DROWNING.

While two of Mr. Hembury's fishermen at Argyle shore, Patrick Ferguson and Malcolm McPail, were on their trawls on Friday last, they saw a boat belonging to the Portland Packing Company upset. They at once started for the scene of the disaster, which was two miles off shore. When they got there they found the boat sunk, and saw a man floating on a log. The man proved to be Alex. McDougall, of Black Point. He was in a very exhausted condition, and could not swim. They took him into their boat and rowed to the shore. Had they been a few minutes later he would undoubtedly have been drowned. Messrs. Ferguson and McPail will doubtless be suitably remunerated by the Dominion Government for their timely action.

MOMENTS OF AGONY.

The San Francisco Call, in its account of the wreck of the Colima, as told by the survivors of the wrecked vessel, says: The ship was overloaded, badly loaded, top-heavy loaded. All agreed to it. When the gale struck her, she weathered it badly. Then she came, and she did not right again. Men called out to the captain to cut away the deckloading of heavy stores. The captain was reluctant. The ship listed more and more. With apprehension everybody waited, held his breath till she shuddered and righted again, but she did not right. She listed still more. Then she lost her steering power. It was not regained. Still the vessel listed. The panic on board grew worse. Then the captain gave orders for the crew to keep the passengers within bounds. Steerage and cabin passengers say they sought to obtain life preservers and were forcibly restrained from doing so. Too late were the preparations allowed and nothing could avert the awful fate that came upon the ship's company.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Mayor Dawson presided, and there was a full attendance of members.

AFTER ROUTINE.

Mayor Dawson intimated that he had been visited upon by the Queen Square Gardens Committee, and that they accepted the resolution passed by the Council and he had signed the check for the grant.

COUNCILLOR TANTON, chairman of the Public Property Committee, submitted the following report:

CHARLOTTETOWN, June 10. To His Worship the Mayor and City Council: Your Public Property Committee beg leave to report to this Council that on the 11th and 14th of May last they inspected Victoria Park and surroundings, as well as other city property, and feel in duty bound to acquaint the Council with the fact that a large number of trees, a spruce grove, numbering probably near 100 trees, have been cut and removed from the Park without the knowledge or consent of the Park Committee as at present constituted.

YOUR COMMITTEE also reported that at that date the work of clearing and putting the park in order, had not been in a satisfactory state of advancement.

Since the occasion of our first visit, however, this work has been attended to much more satisfactorily, and in justice to the keeper, we must express our satisfaction at his greater diligence displayed, causing the park to make a more presentable appearance.

Councillor Tanton moved that the report be adopted.

Councillor Hughes moved in amendment that the report be referred back to the Public Property Committee, and that the committee, with the Mayor, be authorized to hold an investigation into the park management and report upon the same at next meeting of Council. The amendment carried.

Mayor Dawson said he had been waited upon by two gentlemen who complained that Hillsborough Square was not being looked after by the city as it should be. They thought that the city should do something for this square, and he agreed with them. His Worship also called attention to the condition of the several other city squares, and expressed the hope that something would be done.

Councillor Tanton referred to the condition of Spring Park, and submitted a resolution providing that the well at that place be walled and put in proper repair. The resolution carried.

A specification for the new electric light contract was adopted.

In reply to Councillor Hughes it was stated that the matter of placing a fire alarm box at the eastern end of Fitzroy Street would be attended to at once.

Councillor Hughes moved that the new street immediately North of Highland Avenue be known as McGill Avenue.

Councillor Tanton moved in amendment that it be known as Hughes Promenade.

Councillor Hughes' motion carried.

Councillor Hooper asked what action the Street Committee had taken in the Bolger matter?

Councillor Hughes said the Committee found it impossible to do anything in the matter. He promised to bring in a written report at the next meeting.

Council adjourned sine die.
