MR. MARTIN MAHAR

On the morning of July 26 the Angel of Death visited the home of Daniel F. Hughes, 366 Centre St., Jamaica Plain, Mass., and called the soul of Mr. Martin Mahar to his eternal reward.

Mr. Mahar will be remembered in Charlottetown as one of the oldest employees of the Prince Edward Island Railway, now the C. N. R. Mr. Mahar lived all his life in Charlottetown up to 1924 when he and Mrs. Mahar and family moved to the United States. Since the death of his wife who predeceased him four years ago, he had made his home with his daughter Mrs. D. F. Hughes (Lotte).

Mr. Mahar was in good health up to last May when he was confined to his bed and despite the best of medical care and kind attention by his two daughters Mrs. Hughes and Miss Lena, he passed away on the above date. He was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church and received the last rites of his church from the Rev. Father Clarke of the Blessed Sacrament Church, Jamaica Plain, Mass.

After his retirement from the P. E. I. Railway, he and his late wife conducted a hotel in Charlottetown for a number of years. He leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, three sons and three daughters: Walter, Allston, Mass.; Lem, Roxbury, Mass.; Harold, Lena and Mrs. Hughes, Jamaica Plain, and Mrs. Harry Smith (Evelyn) Buffalo, New York; also two sisters, Margaret, Mrs. Vaughn, Roxbury; Hannah, Mrs. Ryan, Castleton; one son, Frank predeceased him 10 years ago.
