By the death of Mr. John Scott, which occurred yesterday, Charlottetown loses one of its oldest citizens. Mr. Scott was for years in the employ of the Steam Navigation Company, and was well and favorably known. He was treasurer of Zion Church for a long time. He has been in failing health for a number of years. His widow and family have the sympathy of all.

T. C. James, Esq., of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, returned home last evening looking all the better for his trip through Cape Breton and Newfoundland. While travelling in the Ancient Colony he had besides the pleasure of seeing a number of his old friends that of the company of Principal Grant and Sir Sanford Fleming. He left Miss James in Cape Breton, where she will spend the remainder of the holidays.

Rev W D Mackinnon, a native of Melrose, Prince Edward Island, is one of our distinguished islanders abroad. He is chaplain of the First San Francisco Regiment, which was sent to Manila. Before leaving San Francisco with his regiment he was presented with a tent, which is to be used as a portable church. He and a Father Doherty are the two priests sent to Manila by General Merritt, to confer with the ecclesiastical authorities there concerning the advisability of urging upon the people peacable submission to the United States.—Summerside Agriculturist.

Mr. G. M. Acklom, M. A., head master of Harrow House School, Halifax, is staying at the Hotel Davies.

Harrow House is a new school for young boys, which was opened last September in Halifax.

Only pupils between the ages of 8 and 14 years are received at the school, and the number is limited so as to ensure direct personal supervision of each boy's work and behaviour, and the tuition is English in every respect.

The past scholastic year has been so successful that new premises have been added to the school, allowing of an increased number of pupils being accommodated.

Among the resident pupils are the sons of the Bishop of New Westminster, Sir Chas Hibbert Tupper, Capt Spain, R. N., and H S Poole, of Stellarton.

TRAGEDY ON THE BONAVISTA.—A tragic affair occurred on board the steamer Bonavista while en route to Montreal. Philip Bailey, of Montreal, was found dead in his berth with a revolver wound in his head. The weapon lay near by. An inquest was held at which it was shown that the wound must have been self-inflicted, but in the absence of any cause for suicide, a verdict of accidental death was returned. The young man, who was a son of James Bailey, wharf superintendent of the Thomson line, was returning from a vacation in Newfoundland when he met his tragic end.

HAND INJURED.—Mr. Michael Power, stevedore on the Plant Line Steamer Halifax, had the fingers of his left hand crushed by some of the hoisting gear yesterday, and three of them had to be taken off near the first joint. The operation was performed at the Charlottetown Hospital by Drs. Conroy and Jenkins.

POLICE COURT.—Two drunks made up the docket this morning. Ernie's Rooney was fined \$2 or 10 days and Henry Burns \$5 or 30 days. Daniel Clary was also fined \$5 or 30 days. In Clary's case, the fine was ordered to be suspended for one day in order to give the prisoner an opportunity of returning to his home in Nova Scotia.

A BAD ACCIDENT.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says: Mrs Joseph Reeves of Freetown met with a somewhat severe accident last Monday. When driving accompanied by two young children her horse took fright and ran away, upsetting the carriage and throwing the occupants out. Mrs. Reeves had an ankle dislocated and some of the smaller bones broken. One of the children had her arm severely bruised; the other a little boy, escaped unhurt.

THE PRESIDENT'S MEDAL.—The medal given by President McIsaac of the best all round athlete at the Scottish Gathering at St. Peter's Bay on the 17th inst., is on view in the show window of E. W. Taylor's jewelry store. The medal is of silver, and is a beauty. On the disk is the inscription "Best Athlete," and on one of the arms "Annual Gathering," and on the other "Caledonian Club of P.E. Island." On the pin from which the medal is suspended is the inscription "President's Prize. The programme of sports is very complete and should attract a great number of people to the gathering.

THE EUREKA IN PORT.—The steamer Eureka, of the Public Works Department, arrived here last night about nine o'clock, and is now lying at Pownal wharf. Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works, is on board with his family, including Mr. Eugene Tarte of La Patrie. Besides his private secretary, Mr. Fred Gellings, Mr. Tarte has with him Mr. Eugene Lefleur, of the Public Works Department, Mr. Rudolph Lemioux, M. P., for Gaspe, and Mr R J Russell of Halifax, the latter gentleman going as far as the Magdalen Islands. The Eureka is commanded by Captain Bernier, of North Pole fame, who was here last fall in the steam yacht Equiper. It is understood that the Eureka will proceed to Magdalen Islands from this port. This morning Hon Mr. Tarte, accompanied by Sir Louis Davies, called at the Bishop's palace. This afternoon the Minister will probably go west on a tour of inspection.
