Ottawa Man Winner Of Bankers' Match Shoot-Off Yesterday

CONNAUGHT RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 14 (CP)—Capt. R. W. Hampton of Ottawa today won the shoot-off in the Bankers' Match at the 83rd annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot.

The 38-year-old army headquarters officer poured 11 shots into the bulls-eye before he bested two other veteran riflemen to win the J. P. Patterson Cup.

Capt. Hampton, Capt. F. E. H. Godfrey of Wiltshire, Eng., and Lt.-Col. Stephen Johnson of Calgary all finished with possible 100s from 300 and 600 yards.

The shoot-off was fired under heavy skies and a southeast wind that covered these ranges, 14 miles west of Ottawa, all day.

The three marksmen shot bullseyes for the regulation five-rounds in the shoot-off. Then a hush fell over the range as the competitors began shooting for shot. Lt.-Col. Johnson was the first to drop out. He scored seven bullseyes but dropped to an inner on his eighth.

It was between Capt. Hampton, twice a member of the Canadian Bisley team, and Capt. Godfrey, who is in charge of the 16-man British cadet team.

Both fired two more bulls-eyes each after Johnson dropped from the match, in the grand and all comers' aggregate. Then on the 11th Capt. Godfrey fired an inner and tension rose as Capt. Hampton readied for his shot. Seconds later it was all over as the white marker scoring it as a bull.

In the second major event of the day, five riflemen tied for first place with possible 100s in the MacDougall Match, which is also a grand and all comers' aggregate affair.

The five riflemen shot possible 100s from 500 yards and registered perfect scores from 200 yards. The shoot-off to decide the winner of the MacDougall Challenge Cup will be held late tomorrow.

Tied with perfect scores were WO. 1. R. Mitchell, Fredericton; Sgt. F. H. Wallace, Toronto; Csm. H. Rusk, Ottawa; Cadet Gerald Ouellette, Windsor, Ont., and Maj. J. W. Houlden, Winnipeg.

P. E. I. Reg't Third

Army Headquarters, Ottawa, captured a double victory by winning the Barlow Match from 600 yards to win a challenge cup presented by the late Colonel John Barlow, London, Eng., with 185 and the placed second with 184.

In the machine gun event Army Headquarters again placed first with a score of 113 and was closely followed by the Winnipeg Light Infantry, second with 111.

The Manitoba Air Cadet team, Winnipeg, won the Tysie Team Match, posting a score of 191 of a possible 200 to win the challenge cup presented by the late Hon. Senator J. A. McDonald.

Following closely were the Governor-General's Foot Guards, Ottawa, with 190, and "C" Division of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Montreal, with 189.

The Steinhart Trophy, presented by the late Laurence Steinhart, former ambassador to Canada, for provincial tyro teams went to the Manitoba Provincial Rifle Association. The six-man team carded a score of 299 of a possible 300 to edge out teams from the British Columbia Rifle Association and the Ontario Rifle Association.

against 502, 1,190 Belgians against 229 and 909 Finns against 265.

From Iron Curtain

The total from Iron Curtain countries also went up. They were either Iron Curtain nationals living in Free Europe or in D. P. camps. They included 4,880 Poles against 3,970, 2,138 Estonians against 808, 2,642 Ukrainians against 2,373, 1,642 Czechs against 552, 1,259 Latvians against 1,128, 686 Russians against 287, and 518 Lithuanians against 586.

From Southern Europe came 9,522 Italians against 3,677, 1,819 Magyars against 762, 1,994 Germans against 316, and 410 Romanians against 173. Yugoslavia's total was 1,589 against 466 a year ago.

More immigrants came from the United States as well, the six-month total of 3,688 exceeding by more than 400 the 3,244 who entered in the corresponding 1950 period.

The number of Chinese went up to 1,304 from 629 and Negroes to 2,400 from 1,500 while Japanese dropped to 2 from 8.

The department said the grand total of 79,875 included 37,472 men, 22,183 women and 20,190 children under 18.

Their occupational backgrounds included: 13,494 farmers; 11,300 skilled workers; 10,517 unskilled and semi-skilled workers; 2,267 clerical workers; 1,609 professional workers; 1,400 in training classes and 2,715 female domestics.

announcement from New Delhi was expected soon.

No official comment was available in New Delhi. Authoritative sources there said India will make its decision on the San Francisco meeting once the revised treaty draft is available.

Faith in the effectiveness of the proposed treaty has been shaken by the hostility shown toward it by non-Communist Asian countries. London observers said the Asiatic attitude will be more telling than Russian attendance, presumably with the intention of challenging the American-sponsored draft.

Burma and the Philippines already are openly antagonistic to the draft treaty because of its failure to provide reparations. Indonesia's attitude is unknown.
