Carmen Basilio Flattens Saxton In Second Round

By JACK HAND CLEVELAND (AP) — Carmen Basilio, a grim-faced warrior, made short work of Johnny Saxton Friday night, bombing the ex-champ with a chilling left hook to retain his world welterweight title on a knockout in 2:42 of the second round.

Basilio, determined to let his own two hands do the officiating in this brief battle, chased bewildered Johnny from corner to corner with wicked punches.

Near the end of the second round Basilio caught Saxton near mid-ring with a numbing left hook that dropped the New Yorker on the ring deck. He rolled over once and started to get up, but referee Tony La Branche ruled his gloves still were on the floor when he counted 10.

CHEERS RAISE ROOF Cheers echoed off the walls of the Cleveland Arena as the 29-year-old union farmer from Canton, Ohio, won his third bout of this controversial "series."

Never from the opening bell was there any doubt about the eventual outcome. If Saxton expected to box and run as he did at Chicago last March when he won the title on a highly-disputed decision he never got a chance to put his plan into operation.

Basilio stormed out from the first bell and poured leather at him with both hands, with thudding wallops that had Saxton trying desperately to grab and hold.

So overanxious was Basilio to finish the Saxton series for keeps that he almost fell on his face from the force of a missed left hook in the first round.

The craggy-faced ex-marine dropped to both knees for a few seconds in silent prayer after the quick ending, while his corner crew whooped it up in a loud celebration for the 3-1-to-1 favorite.

Strong and determined at 147 pounds, the same weight as the every fighter.

"He tried to hit and run," said Basilio. "But when I caught him with that left in the first round he tried to stay close and hang on."

"I could see it in his eyes right then that he wasn't going to last but I was swinging so much that I had to pace myself before getting him in the second."

"I could have ended it sooner with six-ounce gloves, for I had some pretty good shots at him. But he takes a good punch, Saxton does."

Joe Netro and Johnny de John, his co-managers, said they want to send Basilio into a summer "money match" with the winner of the April middleweight title bout between Sugar Ray Robinson and Gene Fullmer.

Ups And Downs Of Hun Population Is A Mystery

Hungarian partridge can weather severe snow storms if they are accompanied by frost and high winds. It's frozen snow crystals that fall down through the thickets and hedges like coarse silt to a depth of ten inches or a foot followed by a silver thaw that really puts a strange hold on them.
