

The Invitation Policy Set By P. M. Diefenbaker

OTTAWA (CP) — Government officials planning the Queen's visit to Ottawa in October still are trying to decide who to invite to what and when.

They've solved some problems, but not all. The invitation policy, which will receive Prime Minister Diefenbaker's personal attention, still hasn't been decided.

But it's a good bet that the Table of Precedence for Canada will be the main guide when invitations go out. The table starts with the governor-general and runs the gamut through such dignitaries as ambassadors, provincial lieutenant-governors, privy councillors, members of Parliament, justices and high churchmen. It covers about 1,000 persons.

Roughly 1,000 persons will be jammed into the Senate chamber when Queen Elizabeth opens Parliament Oct. 14.

Governor-General Massey, who normally opens Parliament, will stay at home at Government

House. An official explained that it would not be proper for the Queen's representative to attend such a function presided over by the Queen.

In addition to the invited guests, members of the House of Commons will stand at the bar of the Senate, at the rear of the chamber.
