PERSONAL

Prof. Jas. Fealy, B. A., of Burlington, P. E. Island, who has been visiting St. John, returned home on Tuesday.—St. John Telegraph.

Mr. Arthur J. Macneill, son of Dr. Macneill of Stanley Bridge, is we regret to learn from a telegram received last night, ill at Montreal. He was on his way home from Brandon, Man., and on the journey, caught typhoid fever. He is now in the Victoria General Hospital. His father will leave on Monday for Montreal.

Rev. Father McNally, curate of St. Patrick's church, gave his initial sermon there last evening on the necessity of avoiding evil. Rev. Father McNally showed himself to be possessed of a clear voice, and likewise to be a careful and deep reasoner. He took as his text, "Give not place to the devil," from the 4th chapter, 27th verse of St. Paul to the Ephesians.

The Rev. Dr. McNally, (of Summerside) whose departure for Ottawa we noticed last week, has been appointed by Archbishop Duhamel to be assistant to Rev. M. J. Whelan, pastor of St. Patrick's Church at the Capital. Father Whelan's parish includes all the English-speaking Catholics of Centre and Upper Town, and he is known as an earnest worker in temperance and charitable movements. He is thus thrown much in communication with the Protestant community by whom he is greatly respected. From the Ottawa Journal of the 18th, inst., we clip the following:

"Rev. Father Whelan before his sermon at high mass in St. Patrick's church yesterday morning, said that he had much pleasure in announcing that Rev. Father McNally had been appointed curate to St. Patrick's church. Rev. Father McNally, he said, had just come from Rome, Italy, after graduating from the College of the Propaganda there, where he had spent the last five years. He thus considered the appointment of Father McNally a great honor to St. Patrick's church, and hoped the new curate's stay in the parish would be long and happy."
