

# Eden Gives House Report On Talks At Washington

LONDON (Reuters)—Prime Minister Eden told the House of Commons Monday that he and President Eisenhower discussed the possible regulation or limitation of nuclear weapons tests during their Washington talks.

Eden said investigations were taking place in Britain and America to see whether the tests gave rise to "any appreciable hazard."

"But I am bound to report," he said, "that Her Majesty's government and the United States government at present share the conviction that the radiation dose to human beings arising from the testing of nuclear weapons at the present rate is insignificant compared with the radiation dose received from natural causes."

Eden also said that "certain differences" exist between him and President Eisenhower over Far Eastern policy. Britain has been pressing for a relaxation of the trade embargo on Communist China.

"We have not receded from our position, nor, it is fair to say, have the United States government modified theirs," he said.

But the control of trade in strategic materials with Communist China will be reviewed, Eden noted. He expressed the hope that proposals for a review would in due course be brought to the China committee of the Paris consulta-

## Kensington Town Council Monthly Meeting Last Night

The regular monthly meeting of the Kensington Town Council was held last evening with Mayor Darrach and Councillors Paynter, MacLeod and Kennedy present.

Bills amounting to \$1165.31 were passed and ordered paid. It was announced at the meeting that the new pump ordered for clearing water from basements in the town had arrived and delivery of it will be taken today. The cost of the pump was reported to be \$466.91.

Mayor Darrach said that the pump will go into operation at once. Regarding the new fire truck, which had been ordered some time ago, Councillor Kennedy reported that he had phoned Toronto and that delivery had been held up due to a strike at the manufacturing plant. It is hoped however that delivery of the vehicle will be made without too much further delay.

Councillor Paynter was congratulated by Mayor Darrach and the other councillors present for the splendid work he had done as chairman of the light committee and clearing basements of water following the disastrous storm. It was conceded that his efforts had been very effective in bringing light to the people of Kensington with the least possible delay.

Regarding the matter of water and sewerage for Kensington, a letter was read from the Minister of Highways Mr. George MacKay advising that nothing definite had been done about this matter but that the government was giving serious consideration to a plan for water and sewerage facilities for all small towns in the Province. The police were instructed to attend to the matter of snow removal from the streets as well as the removal of icicles from buildings in the town where they constituted a danger to the people passing.
