BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

HOME RULE.

Mr. Gladstone Cheered.

LONDON, April 9. At a conference of the Conservatives at Lord Salisbury's residence this afternoon, it was resolved to support the Marquis of Hartington if he opposes Gladstone's Irish policy.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Amendment of the Scott Act.

OTTAWA, April 9. The House met at 3 p. m. Mr. Jamsin introduced a bill further to amend the Scott Act. He explained that the bill was nearly similar to the one introduced last session.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS.

Mr. McMillen (Middlesex) introduced a bill providing for the distribution of estates of insolvent debtors.

Hon. Mr. White introduced a bill amending the Dominion Land Act of 1883.

INLAND REVENUE.

Hon. Mr. Costigan gave notice that on Tuesday next he would move the House into committee to consider the amendment of the consolidated Revenue Act.

On the second reading of Act respecting the extension of Intercolonial Railway to Picton Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. Mills attacked the expenditure as unnecessary, and thought the ferry good enough.

Fatal Shooting.

ST. LOUIS, April 9. Four deputy guards stationed at Louisville and Nashville yards, fired into a crowd of 300 strikers this afternoon, without any cause.

Shooting Affray.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 9. Forty to fifty strikers attacked the guard at the railroad yard here last night and a general shooting followed.

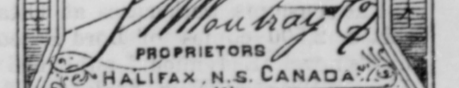
