

The Black Watch.

The famous "42nd Highlanders" (famously known in the British army as the Black Watch) says the New York Times, have added one more to their countless exploits by the storming of the Arab entrenchment at Bati, where poor Gen. Earle was killed. Among the many deeds of daring performed by them in recent wars three stand out pre-eminent. They were one of the three Highland regiments with which Sir Colin Campbell (afterward Lord Clyde) broke the Russian centre at the Alma on Sept. 26, 1854. They formed part of the immortal "thin red line" topped with steel, against an overwhelming Russian force shattered itself in the memorable attack upon Balaclava five weeks after. In the advance upon Comaassie during Gen. Wolsley's Ashantee campaign, in January, 1874, the "Black Watch" bore the brunt of the great fight at Amoaful, suffering severe loss in carrying at the point of the bayonet a thick wood held by native sharpshooters. Indeed, every one must admit that they have fully obeyed the injunction with which their chief led them up the Alma hillside: "Now, my men, make me proud of the Highland brigade."

How Col. Burnaby Died.

AN ERROR OF JUDGMENT WHICH HIM HIS LIFE. The despatches sent by Mr. Charles Williams, special correspondent of the London Cable News, from Abu Klea last month, and suppressed by Gen. Wolsley, are to be published. They give the most graphic and unbiased description of Gen. Stewart's battle in which Col. Fred Burnaby was killed, and in which the British square was broken by the Arabs by sheer weight of numbers. The report of Mr. Williams throws a new light on the occurrence. He says the disaster was caused by an unauthorized order given by Col. Burnaby for the dismounted cavalry, forming part of one side of the square to advance to meet the charge of the Arab spearman. Col. Burnaby gallantly led his advance, and was killed in the hand-to-hand fight that ensued. The cavalry men were swept back and the Arabs, swarming all around them, forced their way into the square through the gap caused by the cavalrymen's advance. It was a plucky movement and Col. Burnaby expiated the mistake in judgment which prompted it, but it terribly imperiled the safety of the whole force and cost many lives besides Col. Burnaby. Mr. Williams says that after this action and the one near Gubat the wounded suffered fearful agonies from the effects of the sun and the impossibility of obtaining sufficient water to drink or to dress their wounds.

THOUGHT AND METHOD NECESSARY TO SAVE TOIL. When there is too much house there is always too little home. Good house-keeping is by no means as rare as good home-keeping. It is of far less importance. A certain amount of drudgery must be gone through with daily in any calling; about three-fourths of life is drudgery. It requires much giving up and letting go. What shall we give up? Ah, there's the rub. Everything seems so important. Things must be kept clean, there is no doubt about that; but the number of things to be kept clean can be greatly diminished. Wisdom would suggest the minimum consistent with comfort and refinement. In many homes there is an embarrassment of riches in the shape of conveniences and petty treasures that must be kept in order, stealing time that might be bestowed with profit and satisfaction upon the higher things of life; people, books, art, nature and all the subtle excellencies that make life worth living. Each must solve for herself the question of simplifying living in order to ennoble domestic life. Every woman knows her own complexity. The same things do not press with equal weight upon all. On general principles, however, it is safe to say that "There's too much worry goes to a bonnet, There's too much ironing goes to a shirt." There are too many preserves, too many ruffles and tucks and elaboration in the making and trimming of garments, that add labor and do not add to their beauty.
