

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

MORE FENIAN ARRESTS ACCOMPLISHED!

New York, Oct. 19.

Steamship "Scotia," with dates to the 8th, arrived today. Fenianism is still the engrossing topic in the Irish Provinces. Arrests continue. Among the latest are the proprietor and printer of the *Connaught Patriot*, for a seditious article in that paper. Strict surveillance is kept on vessels from America at Queenstown. Eight additional Fenians have been examined in Dublin and committed for trial.

Liverpool, Oct. 7th, evening.—At Dublin yesterday, Mr. O'Bennar, of the *Connaught Patriot*, was committed for trial on the double charge of treason and felony.

The American correspondent of the *Times* says that Sir F. Bruce had asked Mr. Seward for an explanation of various Fenian movements throughout America. He also represents a general amnesty as likely to be proclaimed by President Johnson.

The body of a man was discovered among the cargo of the steamer "Queen," from New York. It is believed to have been placed there when loading.

A Royal Commission has been appointed in England to enquire into the cattle disease.

Parties alleged to have been connected with the Confederate loan continue to publish denials. Mr. Lindsay confesses to a small loss.

Paris letters assert that the allocution recently delivered by the Pope against secret societies was due to the suggestion of the Archbishop of London, who wished in this manner to obtain a condemnation of Fenianism.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 19.

At the Fenian Convention to-day, Patrick J. Wheelan, a prominent Irish American journalist, having just returned from a tour in Ireland, during which he was intimately connected with the Irish Fenians, and informed himself of their plans, represented the organization to be powerful and under skillful leaders.

The number present has been increased by delegations from the West, and a California delegation is expected. The Financial matters being perfected, subscriptions to the loan will soon begin.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.

The Barque *Aden*, from Hakodadi, Japan, Sept. 15, arrived at Victoria, British Columbia, on the 8th inst.

The captain reports that before he left the Tycoon's forces came into collision with armies of the rebellious Prince Nugatto; that there had been great slaughter, and that it was rumoured that Prince Satzuma had joined. Other rumours were to the effect that peace would soon be declared.

A fearful hurricane in the China Sea had destroyed three large steamers and several American and English ships.

It is said that Maximillian has issued a decree prohibiting vessels entering Mexican ports which have not papers from duly accredited officials of his Empire.

DELIGHTFUL STATE OF AFFAIRS IN THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.—Stabbing, shooting, garroting and killing are daily pastimes in Washington. A member of the First District of Columbia regiment (colored) shot a colored woman fatally last night. A squad from the same regiment attacked, stabbed and dangerously wounded two or three privates of the Fifth United States cavalry two nights ago. Last night a scavenger of the Seventh ward gave a negro a fatal blow with a spade. Every night robbery, garroting and burglary are perpetrated. These little pleasantries, added to the general and widespread unhealthiness of the city at the present time, are likely to deter many from locating here at present and to drive away others who regard health and personal safety paramount to all other considerations.—*N.
