

Presbyterians Give Okay To National Health Service

TORONTO (CP) — The 80th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada has been asked to approve in principle a national health service for Canada.

The time has come for the church to declare itself on this question of such vital importance to so many Canadians," said a report by the board of evangelism and social action.

The resolution, which will be considered at later sessions, urged approval "providing due recognition is given to the rights and the best interests of the medical profession." It also stipulated the plan be worked out in close consultation with doctors.

"While we should not suggest that the church commit itself to any specific health service, we believe that in principle a national health service is in harmony with the spirit of the gospel of Jesus Christ," said board chairman Rev. William Lawson of Windsor, Ont.

OPPOSES RIGHTS

The board's report also warned against increased right-wing activity in Canada. It said much of this activity is done in the name of democracy and "Christian values" and proves attractive to many sincere Christians.

"We encourage vigilance . . . that we may study the threat of communism rather than the technique of anti-communism and that we may refuse support to the rightist propaganda and unless there is clear evidence of subversive activity or un-democratic procedure," it said.

The assembly decided to restrict the power of its committee on international affairs after several delegates urged its abolition.

The committee will continue to exist, but its authority to make announcements was referred to a committee to be appointed at the discretion of moderator Rev. Dr. Harry

Cattle Plan For Nfld. Said 'Dream'

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — A cattle company's long-range plan to use Newfoundland's Morier Bay as a shipping port was described as a "pretty ambitious dream" by Premier Smallwood in the Newfoundland legislature.

Mr. Smallwood said he believed Trans-Atlantic Packers Limited plans to bring 600 head of cattle to the Morier Bay area of the Burin Peninsula this summer hoping to fatten them on the peninsula's plentiful wild grass.

The company hopes to put enough weight on the animals to make the venture profitable, Mr. Smallwood said. The cattle would be fed during the winter on hay brought in by boat from Nova Scotia or New Brunswick and would be sold in Newfoundland, at least at the start.

If and when Morier Bay is developed as a shipping point, the company hoped to market the beef in other parts of the world, he said.

"That's a pretty ambitious dream," Mr. Smallwood said. He wished the company "all the luck in the world, they'll need it."

Argentina Has Rare Epidemic

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — More than 100 persons have been stricken with a rare virus—O'Higgins disease — which is often fatal. Doctors said Monday it had reached epidemic proportions in west Buenos Aires province. No fatalities have been reported. The disease is carried by field mice and transmitted to humans by fleas. It resembles a flu in the early stages, but later causes internal bleeding.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (Reuters) — Pocket-sized tear-gas "bombs" operated like an anti-fly spray went on sale to whites only here.

A Johannesburg dealer said: "I think this will be a first-class product. Although it is a bit early to tell, demand has

been quite brisk and we have sold quite a few.

The canisters, costing about \$12, contain about 80 shots each — "enough to deal with a whole mob if necessary," according to advertisements.

The tear-gas spray is said to blind a person totally for 10 minutes when fired from as far as 12 feet but to have no lasting effect.

It is the invention of a West German immigrant, Gunther

Manfred Pius, who worked on gas research for the West German army. He came here in 1958.
