18-Per-Percent Hike Plus Health Plan

MONTREAL, (CP) - Canadian railwaymen are going after an 18-per-cent wage increase and a health plan, it was announced here late Wednesday.

Frank Hall - speaking for 145,000 railwaymen in 15 "non-operating" unions - said notice of the demands will be served early in November, asking that they be made effective from next Jan. 1.

Issuing a four-point statement at a press conference following a two-day general committee conference of the unions, Mr. Hall said details of the proposed health and welfare plan now are being worked out by a sub-committee.

1. A wage increase of 18 per cent on all existing rates of pay, effective Jan. 1.

2. A health and welfare plan, details of which are presently being worked out.

3. Pay for three additional holidays. The present agreements provide pay for five holidays for hourly-rated employees only.

4. Extension of pay for these eight holidays to all monthly-rated workers.

HALIFAX, (CP) - The weather office here says the high-pressure area that caused the fine weather Wednesday is now moving away from the district and cloud has begun moving into the northwestern regions.

Another high-pressure area follows the band of showers and this high, like the one just gone by, is accompanied by fine, cool weather.
