

# Game Goes 13 Innings; Rollaway Edges Lions 3-2

No-doubt about it, this first game of the best of seven final series for the City Softball crown, between Aces and Lions, was the best seen here in a long time.

The contest, which took two nights to complete, went a total of thirteen innings, with the Aces eking out a 3-2 victory over their Parkdale rivals.

Wednesday night the game was called off at the bottom of the sixth inning with the score knotted at 1-1.

Ralph Pineau went the route for the winners, limiting his opponents to nine hits, two of

them doubles, both by shortstop Buck Whitlock.

Art Ballem and Vince Bradley shared mound duty for the losers. Ballem hurled for six and one half innings, being relieved by speedball artist Vince Bradley in the top of the eighth. Both moundmen were tagged for five hits.

It was a pitcher's duel all the way and the 1-1 tie wasn't broken till the top of the twelfth, when George Bradley, first sacker with the Aces, smashed a double with one man on.

However, the Lions deadlocked the game again in their half of the frame. With one man out,

Forbie Kennedy got to first on a single. Buck Whitlock, the next man up, got Kennedy all the way to third with a double. Kennedy came home when Kip Ready poled a long fly ball into centrefield.

The Aces notched their victory in the top of the 13th, with a one run. They then held the Lions hitless in their turn at bat.

Both umpire and base judges had to be on their toes at all times, having to make close decisions on several occasions. Charlie Ryan called the balls and strikes with Bill Coughlan and Ivan Connors handling the bases.

# Two Former Champions Battle Tonight For Title

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two brawling bellers who have won the world middleweight crown will battle tonight to regain a big share of the world title.

Carmen Basilio, the crazy-faced warrior from Chiffenango, N.Y., and Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, tangle for 15 rounds or less at the Cow Palace.

The winner gets the National Boxing Association blessing as victor of the 160-pound division, a spot declared vacant last May 4 when the ruling body withdrew the championship from Sugar Ray Robinson for not defending it.

Robinson hadn't fought since winning the title from Basilio in a bloody battle March 25, 1958. The year before, Fullmer had won and lost in a pair with Sugar Ray. Although the NBA stripped Robinson of his laurels, he's still recognized as champ in New York and Massachusetts.

**GOOD GATE EXPECTED**

A gate of \$200,000 was expected with another \$175,000 from television (NBC) for the 7 p.m. PDT (11 p.m. ADT) bout.

Basilio should get about \$140,000 as his share with the Utah strongboy expected to grab more than \$100,000.

The \$175,000 television money represents the highest amount paid for a home video boxing title bout. Promoter Norman Rothschild of Syracuse, N.Y., estimated 60 million would watch the TV production.

Basilio declared he aims to become the second man ever to knock out Fullmer, who has won 10 fights and lost four. Fullmer stopped 21 foes and only Robinson ever stopped him.

Basilio, who held the welterweight crown before stepping up a notch, has gone into the pro ring 74 times, won 54, lost 13 and fought seven draws. He has knocked out 27 and never been stopped.

"Believe," said Fullmer, "that this fight will be decided in the last five rounds and I expect my weight edge to give me the advantage."

"I like to fight the bigger fellows," says Basilio who'll weigh between 153 and 156. "They provide a better target."

Carmen probably will enter the fight a slight favorite but the quoted odds have been falling off. They opened even, then swung as much as 3-1 in favor of Basilio and came back to about 7-5.

Should the two rugged warriors go the limit, the referee and two judges rule on the basis of the 10-point mist system with 10 to the winner of each round—and nine or less to the loser depending on his showing.

## HUNTERS CORNER

### Hunters Are Glad To Hear Flocks Of Geese Sited

The wild geese are with us once again and their pulse-stirring notes gladden the hearts of old time goose hunters. The first flock of 7 was reported from Point Prim on Friday the twenty-first. On Sunday the twenty-third 11 circled over East Lake and had a chin wag with Harris's domesticated wild geese. Since Sunday a farmer stated he listened to a heavy volume of calling from wildgeese on the ground. The birds evidently had bedded down in a field. Harvesting operations have not become general but some grain has been cut.

Since geese started stubble feeding, their early arrival does not mean we are in for an early fall according to this columnist's reasoning. In the old days when geese fed almost exclusively on the eel grass beds they generally arrived during the first week in September but their peak flight did not hit the province till the old time Exhibition Week around the 25th or 26th of the month.

That was the week when goose hunters began their nightly vigil around our fresh water lakes. The record for geese to alight in the Old Home Lake in those days was August 28th. They came in straight from the north and passed over the house. It was sweet music that chased stumber prono. No, I didn't get up and go to the lake if that's what you are thinking. Father was a stickler for hunting season observance and that didn't open until September 1st.

**REMEMBER INCIDENT**

I remember clearly when the season opened on August 20th. It was a few years before I reached the age when I was entrusted with a shotgun. Incidentally I shot my first black duck at the age of 11. I was probably 7 or 8 the early August evening I heard the heavy boom of a shotgun at the Lake and saw a pillar of smoke erupt from the short spruce bushes near a natural blind at the Southwest corner. Father called me and we both headed for the lake on the double. I could run like a deer in those days and was down there in nothing flat. I can still see the late Dick Jardine crashing through the spruce like a bull moose, and after getting a safe distance away squatting on his hunkers at the edge of the barren to watch what transpired.

Two black ducks floated motionless amid the lily pads about 25 feet out from the blind. It's a bottomless lake or so it seems. A layer of mud was under the water and the longest ramplike cut wouldn't reach bottom. We tried it when hauling ice in the winter. We even tied two together with nil results at over 30 feet. Father twisted two ramplike off at their base and tied them together with my braces. I held my knee length jeans up

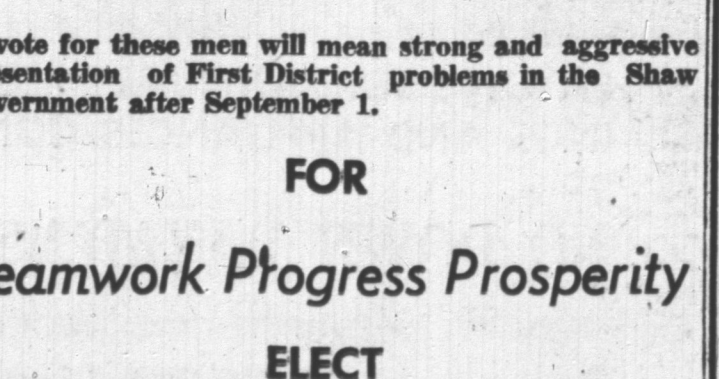
